

Teen-Agers Prominent in Jobless

OTTAWA (CP)—More than a third of Canada's estimated 382,000 jobless workers last month were teen-agers—most of them moving into the labor market for their summer holidays.

The influx of students held back the normal May-to-June drop in unemployment, although the job picture itself was bright in most non-farm industries, except construction.

The bureau of statistics and the federal labor department reported Wednesday that 6,760,000 persons were employed last month, an increase of 152,000 from May and 225,000 from June, 1963.

The May-to-June drop in unemployment, however, was marginal. The number of jobless declined by 11,000 to 382,000, the equivalent of four per cent of the labor force of 7,642,000.

This four-per-cent unemployment rate compares with 4.2 per cent in May, 4.4 per cent in June, 1963, and 4.5 per cent in June, 1962. Seasonally adjusted, the rate was 5.2 per cent, up from the 4.7-per-cent level of the previous two months.

The monthly report is based on a survey of 35,000 households.

RISE SEASONAL.
The labor department said the rise in unemployment was seasonal—just about what can be expected for this time of year. But the decline in unemployment was less than usual, chiefly because of the influx of students.

Unemployment among workers in the 14-to-19-year age grouping increased by 43,000 to 103,000 between May and June, 1964. Seasonally adjusted, the rate was 10.3 per cent. Despite the teen-age crush on jobs, the labor market absorbed many young workers.

The job gains were spread over most non-farm industries, except construction, which showed a noticeable gain in employment, which rose to 610,000 from 574,000 in May. Unemployment in the Atlantic provinces dropped to 32,000 from 42,000. This pushed the unemployment rate to five per cent from 6.8 per cent a month earlier.

Ontario's unemployment rate increased over the month—from 2.8 per cent to 3.4 per cent—while all other areas showed a drop.

CBC Explains Annual Report Deficit Data

OTTAWA (CP)—The CBC says its expenditures didn't really outrun income by \$4,071,553 in the fiscal year ended last March 31.

The publicly-owned broadcasting corporation issued a statement Wednesday to clear up any misapprehension about figures in its annual report, tabled Tuesday in the Commons.

The statement said the CBC "stayed within its budget in 1963-64 and retained \$62,172 as the federal treasury as the unexpended portion of its parliamentary grant."

The idea that the corporation's expenses exceeded income came from the report's summary of financial operations which said "total income for the year was \$11,387,000" and "total expenses . . . amounted to \$15,458,500."

These figures were rounded off in zeros from a financial table showing expense at \$15,458,436 and income at \$11,386,823.

The difference of \$4,071,553 was really depreciation, the CBC said. The depreciation figure was included in the total of expense shown in the summary but wasn't added to the income figure to balance the account.

The report shows net income from the parliamentary grant as \$3,375,928, after deducting the \$62,172 being refunded from the original vote of \$78,438,000.

FORD BLAST INJURES 13
DAGENHAM (Reuters)—An explosion in the Ford Motor Company steel plant in this English city Wednesday injured 13 workers. Most of them were cut by flying glass. When molten metal was poured into a supposedly dry pit that had water in it, the blast shattered about 150 panes of glass and shook buildings nearly two miles away.

COMMUNIST TRADE VISIT
LONDON (Reuters)—A top British government trade official will visit Romania, Bulgaria, Hungary and Czechoslovakia at the end of this month. It was announced here Tuesday, Edward Cunn, minister of state at the British board of trade, will be holding two days of trade talks in the four countries beginning July 20.

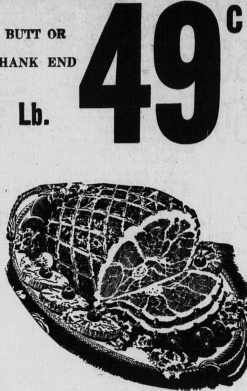
