## NEWSY NOTES

### THE WHOOPING CRANE

The whooping crane is the largest of North American birds, having a wing spread of seven feet. This great bird, known to ornithologists as *Grus Americana*, was first seen in 1589. Its distinctive mating dance is claimed by those who have observed it, to be elaborate and very beautiful. It has a loud, trumpet call, that is correlated with the formation of the trachea. This bugling noise is produced by the air coming down from the lungs through three turns of the trachea, in the hollow space formed by the walls of the keel of the sternum, and produces the bird's characteristic whooping sound when in flight.

Mr. F. S. Baird wrote in 1922: "The whooping crane there is no freedom to the unbounded wilderness... this is a bird that cannot compromise or adjust its way of life to ours. As the human population goes up, the whooping crane's goes down." From 1920 on, the plight of the whooping crane has aroused much public interest in both Canada and the United States. Conservation methods have been instituted and birds were asked to spare these birds during their migratory flights. Their winter sanctuary is where the United States Fish and Wildlife Service has created the 47,000 acre Aransas National Wild Life Refuge, near Austwell, Texas, along the shore of the Gulf of Mexico.

Their migrating flights remain constant, these take them north over Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska, South and North Dakota to Manitoba, then northwesterly across Saskatchewan into Alberta, in the spring. Their nesting grounds were called: "The greatest bird mystery in modern times" however, in 1954 they were located in the Wood Buffalo National Park, a lake and muskeg area on the border between Alberta and the Northwest Territories of Canada. This park and summer sanctuary for the whooping crane covers 17,000 square miles and extends many miles on either side of the boundary.

The large size of this crane and its whooping call no doubt have added to its declination by hunters along the two thousand five hundred miles of its semi-annual migration. Its numbers have risen and fallen year to year, but the trend has been towards extermination. Last winter the count at the Aransas Refuge was 21 or three short of the number of birds that had flown north the previous spring.

This crane (*Grus*) are all large birds, they have long legs, long necks, and long bills, they differ

## TIMELY NOTES ON FUR FARMING

In the National Fur News is a picture of a cyanide mink killing box. The box is built with 1/2" plywood and should be made gas tight as near as possible. Both the lid and the bottom should be glued and nailed. Partitions should be perforated with 1" holes for circulation of the gas. The cyanide is placed on a moistened blotter and the gas is introduced under a screen of wire. It takes very little of the gas to kill the mink but care must be taken as cyanide is a dangerous thing to handle.

An international mink show will be held in Milwaukee January 6-7-8, 1956. Six judges will be used. The judging staff will consist of two ranchers, Harold Reed of Elk Horn, Wis., and Colonel Frank C. Gauthier, Anthon, Iowa, both well known here, and three auctioneer representatives, Jack Veasey, Hudson's Bay Company, Herb Mezger, New York American Co. and George Mayers, American Fur Auctions. It is planned to classify the mink roughly according to color as they come in and they will be grouped on the show tables according to color classes. Final classification will be done just before the mink are judged and will be done under the judging lights.

In a survey of the U. S. fur industry by the Commerce Department, the average mink pelts per million. Ranch raised pelts are just under 3 million. The annual crop of beaver in the U.S.A. is about 125,000. Fifty years ago it ran into millions. Canadian beaver imports were 150,400 in the United States last year. The survey lists the following production figures: muskrat, 18 to 20 million; raccoon, 1.5 to 2 million; weasel, 250 to 300 thousand; wolf, 150 to 200 thousand; badger, 20,000 to 30,000; marten, about 10,000; otter, 12,000 to 15,000.

## MARKET SUMMARY

The National Fur News gives a summary of the current market for furs as follows: Ranch mink standard and mutations—With the recent and normal temperatures in the central and eastern parts of the country, retail activity is slow. Areas has increased. Supplies of raw pelts available on the market are practically nil. Therefore, it becomes a question of clearing out the surplus of merchandise between now and the end of November. Silver Fox—A limited offering of various types was recently placed on the market at Montreal. Approximately 5 per cent of the collection was sold to Europe at unchanged prices ranging from \$8 to \$14. Future market possibilities—Ranch mink standards and mutations—There seems no doubt that the new mink season will be launched in very active fashion. Unusual offerings should reach a ready demand at levels equal to the opening prices of last season.

Of particular interest will be the appearance in larger numbers of new color phases such as Winter-blu, Blue Iris, Palomino, etc. Silver Fox future prospects remain unpredictable. Wild furs—The general outlook for the coming season is quite favorable. Summary—On the whole it would appear that the fur industry should be able to look forward to another good season in 1956; certainly standard and mutation varieties of mink are expected to maintain the leadership among popular furs in best demand again this season.

A despatch from Ottawa states that there was a fractional increase in Canadian department store fur sales in the six months of February—July period this year in comparison with the corresponding months in 1954. The current six month business was reported at \$3,196,000 or almost one per cent above last year's \$3,166,000.

Dates set for the fur auction in Copenhagen, Denmark, for auctions during the 1955-56 season have been issued. The schedule follows: December 12 and 13, 1955—70,000 standard mink, 40,000 mutations, 17 to 20, 1956—190,000 standards, 50,000 mutations. March 1 and 2, 40,000 standards, 20,000 mutations. April 26-27, 30,000 standards, 18,000 mutations. The Danes have certainly made big strides in the last few years. It seems only that period of time since they started breeding mink and it could not have been more than ten years ago at the most. They are hard workers and are intelligent people and will make a success of almost anything they take up.

Muskrat trapping is big business in some parts of the U. S. A. The Raw Fur Dealers Association of the State of New York is endeavoring to have an earlier muskrat trapping season. The Association advocates opening the season between January 1st and 15th and closing it as weather conditions dictate and a sufficient number of animals have been taken.

## PROMOTION

Several department stores have joined with retail specialty forces in Montreal in financing the fur promotional campaign of the Canadian Council of Fur Associations. At least 75 retailers both English and French speaking, are now behind the plan. Funds appear to be sufficient to carry the campaign over the winter season and to culminate in cost storage in the spring.

Fur facts—A guide in purchasing furs is now appearing as a paid advertisement every Saturday in one English and one French language newspaper. It is attracting international attention. In addition to United States queries there are also inquiries from Europe. Since the first ad ran in late July there has been a marked tuning up in the calibre of retail fur advertising in Montreal, according to Arthur C. Prentice, Canadian Fur Auction Sales Co. (Quebec) Ltd.

Silver fox and its mutations is not out of the picture in the United States. The North Iowa and Southern Minnesota Fur Farmers Association are holding an annual live animal fur show at the University of Minnesota, on November 19-20. The fox division will include adult male and female, pup male
