Funeral Of The Late Captain Jay

"The Old Rugged Cross" was beautifully rendered by Mrs. W. S. Jardine, accompanied by Mrs. Bessie Toombs.

The remains were then taken to the People's Cemetery at Mt. Stewart for burial, where the Canadian Legion again paid their last tribute to a comrade who had answered the last call. The Last Post was sounded by a bugler from the Charlottetown Legion.

The pall-bearers were Capt. Wylie Irving, Colin Love, Coleman Rogers, Arthur Sexton, John P. Gallant and Russell Deighan.
