Another factor, he said, which must not be forgotten in considering the matter is that unless these suburban areas do have the facilities for sanitation a very definite health problem may result which may seriously affect the people of the older established community.

Visiting Here From Immigration Office

Miss Doris I. Hutchison of the Department of Immigration Office, Ottawa, arrived in Charlottetown Wednesday night and concluded a three-month coast-to-coast tour yesterday by interviewing Provincial officials, and visiting various parts of the Island.

Miss Hutchison during her trans-Canada journey, which started in Vancouver, gathered information which will be valuable when she commences the two years tour of duty in London England, assisting in screening British women who purpose emigrating to Canada.

Introduced By Minister

The guest speaker was introduced by Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources, who traced his educational attainments and told of his wide experience in engineering in many countries.

The Senator spoke of the Government's interest in beautification as related to planning and spoke of the efforts being made in the Forestry Division and through the nursery at Southport. He paid tribute to Mr. Robert Cotton for his generous gift of \$100,000 to this end and intimated that another similar sum would be both useful and welcome.

He also told of improvements in the roads and traced transportation here from the early travois to boats and sleds and finally to wheels. It was the latter which made roads so necessary because the arteries of commerce.

Commends Organization

Premier A. W. Matheson rose briefly to urge those present to keep up the organization and to express his pleasure at seeing so many from different parts of the Province interested enough in the work to be present.

Dr. P. A. Creelman, chairman of the Charlottetown Branch, spoke of the difficulty in arousing interest in this city and said other communities were far ahead in their planning.

Seated at the head table were Mayor J. D. Stewart, Hon. Mr. Cullen, Senator Jones, Mr. MacNabb, Mr. Claude Smith, chairman of the Provincial Division who presided, Premier Matheson, Mrs. G. Toward, Hon. B. Earle MacDonald, Dr. Creelman and Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan. Joining them later was Mr. John Cameron, Summerside, who represented Mayor Henry Wedge of that Town.

Following the excellent dinner served by the women of the Y.M.C.A., brief entertainment was supplied through a sing-song led by Stanley Lancaster and some interesting readings by A. G. (Dick) Turpin.

The presidential report was presented by Mr. Claude Smith who told of his attendance at the meeting of the National Executive held in Kingston, Ont., last September. He said he learned from the provincial reports given at that time that many of the same problems as Prince Edward Island, among the projects which were being undertaken elsewhere were traffic control, parking, slum clearance, extension of civic boundaries, housing and beautification.

In telling of the Maritime Regional conference at Halifax last month he paid tribute to Dr. Frank MacKinnon, who was guest speaker at the luncheon, for a splendid address. Among matters discussed at that time were basic planning, zoning, sub-division control, civil defence and public playgrounds.

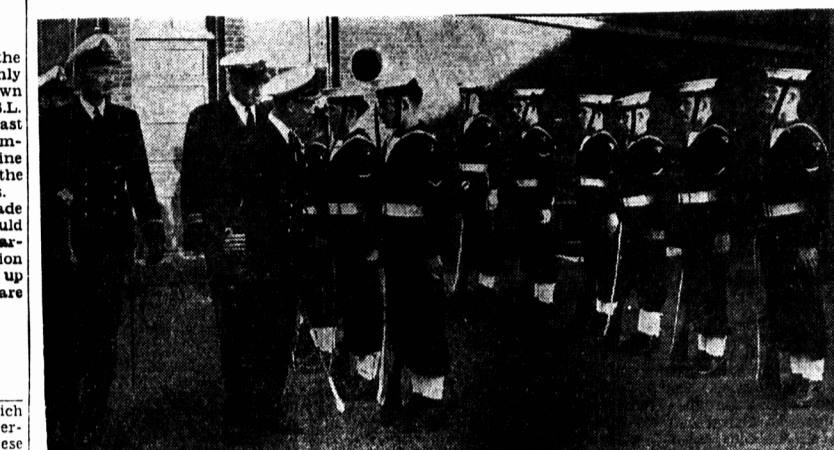
Suspects Branches

Charlottetown Air Cadets Commended On Fine Turnout

Wing Commander L. C. Dillworth, D.F.C. of the R.C.A.F. Station at Summerside made the annual inspection of Charlottetown (60) Air Cadet squadron last evening at the Armouries with 47 members on parade.

W.C. Dillworth, who was accompanied by F.O. Davidge, also inspected the set-up in the quarters of the R.C.A.F. Association, the sponsoring body, where 10 booths of items of particular interest to the student cadets. A number of model aircraft built by the boys drew favourable comment from the large number of visitors, including parents, who were in attendance.

Other booths dealt with visual aids, instruments, navigation, meteorology, aero engines and airframes. Booklets were also distributed describing, in detail many items of value and interest to the cadets.

The visiting officers were guests of the R.C.A.F. Association at a smoker which followed the inspection tour.

FAMOUS PROSPECTOR RETURNS TO THE ISLAND

A well-known prospector from northern Canada returned to his native Island recently. He is Ulric ("Spud") Arsenault, now of Edmonton, Alta., who is visiting relatives and friends in Summerside, Kensington and Borden.

When several old-timers of the north got together with Mr. Arsenault on Monday, May 15, the stories sounded like those from pages of a northern adventure book!

Accompanied by Hugh D. Smith, of Summerside, a Yukon pioneer of 1907, they called on James Pendergast, also an old-time "sour-dough" (1906) and mutual friend. This trio called to see Cpl. King at R. C. M. P. headquarters in Borden.

Mr. Arsenault was at Aklayik, N.W.T., and knew Corporal King when he was sent out to arrest the famous killer "Mad Trapper" Johnson 23 years ago. Corporal King regaled his callers with some intimate details of the world famous case which covered over 500 miles in mid-winter at 40-50 degrees below zero.

Corporal King was shot through the breast with a steel jacket bullet; if a "soft nose" had been used, he would scarcely have survived, he said. The "Mad Trapper" was shot dead after the long chase, but not before he had killed two men and wounded several.

Ulric, ("Spud") as he is familiarly known in the Northwest) has prospected for precious and base metals by dog team, and latterly by aeroplane over great portions of the Northwest Territories, northern B. C. and the Yukon.

He was "in on" the famous La Bine uranium discovery, but was declared "out" by the La Bine Corporation. He left the La Bine and engaged for service with Consolidated Company and was lucky enough to make a worthwhile discovery and sold his interest for \$100,000 cash and a big block of stock.

Although rather small in stature, he has the principle requirements for a successful prospector, viz., a knowledge of geological formations, good common sense, strength and stamina. A lack of excess avoirdupois was a distinct asset in long "mushes" and mountain climbing. The writer has seen him tear a deck of cards lengthwise with his bare hands! A fall from a mountain ridge broke his left wrist, which precludes any further "strong arm" stunts.

The northern prospector is the son of the late J. F. Arsenault, former M. L. A. for Prince County, grandson of the former statesman Senator Arsenault. He is also a nephew of Hon. Justice A. E. Arsenault of Charlottetown.—K.

PROCLAMATION Coronation Of The Queen JUNE 2nd, 1953

Following the proclamation of the federal government, and in conjunction with the said government, I hereby declare the second day of June, nineteen hundred and fifty-three, a civic holiday in the City of Charlottetown.

The day will mark an historic occasion, an event of both solemnity and rejoicing: The Coronation of Her Most Gracious Majesty, Elizabeth II.

In order that the citizens of Charlottetown may join with their fellow-citizens of Canada and the Commonwealth in celebrating the Coronation, appropriate civic and other ceremonies have been arranged. All citizens are invited to participate in the programme and to lend their efforts towards the end that this happy occasion may truly symbolize our loyalty to the Crown, our affection for the Queen and, at the same time, express our hope that her Reign may be long and glorious and that it will mark an era of great and enduring progress, of peace and prosperity for all peoples.

To lend festive colour to the day, it is appropriate that our homes, places of business, factories and offices be suitably decorated and that buildings remain illuminated throughout the evening.

It is my hope and desire that citizens of all faiths and all sections of the community will enter into the festive spirit of this occasion with full heart and with full understanding of its symbolic and underlying spiritual significance.
