

FREIGHT RATES AND FEED GRAIN

The freight assistance policy of Western grain has now been in effect so long that not many farmers realize the effect of this assistance on the cost of feed grain and the production cost of livestock. The policy was to be discontinued and if the railways are granted a 14 per cent increase in freight rates the cost of moving a hundredweight of western grain or its by-products from the head of the lakes to Charlotte town would be over one dollar per hundred.

At the present time the total freight rate to Charlottetown is \$9.00 per ton of which \$12.80 is covered by the freight assistance policy leaving the balance of \$6.20 to be borne by the feeder. When and if the demand of the railway for increase rates is granted the additional cost will be if the pattern of the past is followed, passed on to the feeder. This is a matter that is causing concern to Maritime feeders as it places them at an increasing disadvantage as compared with their fellows in Ontario and most of Quebec.

The Federation of Agriculture has a committee preparing a case on this matter and will in all likelihood be requesting that the farmer's share of the freight bill be limited to \$5.00 a ton with the balance being absorbed under the policy. The freight assistance has been of marked value in developing the Maritime livestock industry and it may not be generally realized to what extent we are depending on it in this part of the world.

THE DELEGATE

Next Monday night Farm Forums will be discussing a topic proposed by the Canadian Federation of Agriculture which is providing the study material for "The Role of the Delegate". In democratic countries organization naturally function along democratic lines but there may be nevertheless variations in the type of meeting and in the method of representation which farm organization employ.

In a membership meeting every member is present and can represent himself and decisions will be made on majority basis. Membership meetings are possible where the area covered by the group is not too large or where really large number of members are not involved.

For the most part provincial and national organizations must use the delegate system, a method by which the authority to make decisions is vested by the membership in certain chosen representatives which become known as delegates. As an example the Prince Edward Island Dairy Farmers' Association is a member body of the Dairy Farmers of Canada and is permitted two voting delegates at an annual meeting of the national body. However, any members of the Dairy Farmers' Association would be free to attend the national meeting and to take part in discussions but they would not have the privilege to vote on questions of policy.

Thus it will be seen that meetings may be of three types those for the membership, those for the delegates and those for a combination of the two. In connection with this matter it may be in order to set out the commonly accepted definition of the words Federation and Union. Strictly speaking a Federation is an organization which joins organizations in a group which are joins individuals in a group. Some organizations may be a combination and that is true of the Island Federation of Agriculture which has individual membership and membership by other associations as well.

FARM LABOUR

At the recent Dominion-Provincial Agriculture Conference the Canadian Federation of Agriculture submitted quite a comprehensive statement dealing with a wide

variety of questions effecting farmers. The following statistics copied from that statement will be of general interest.

Between 1946 and 1956 the following changes took place:

- The number of farms dropped from 695,000 to 531,000—a drop of 24 per cent.
- The total farm labour force dropped from 1,871,000 to 804,000—a drop of 57 per cent.
- The unpaid family labour dropped from 419,000 to 167,000—down 60 per cent.
- The paid labour on farms dropped from 157,000 to 106,000—down 32 per cent.

BUTTER PRODUCTION

Butter production in the province is still below that of a year ago and for the week ending December 1 production stood at 69,300 pounds as against 72,200 a year ago. This decrease is likely for the most part a reflection of the conditions brought about by a very dry fall and resulting scarcity of pasture. Feeding plants are experiencing a decline, poorly finished cattle, this condition is likely apparent in the dairy cattle in the province as well.

U.S. MARKETS

Canada is no longer a major exporter of livestock and dairy products to the world markets, including the U.K. However, substantial markets for hogs, cattle and poultry products have developed in U.S. Dairy products were being marketed in developing the Maritime livestock industry and it may not be generally realized to what extent we are depending on it in this part of the world.

The retention of access to this market depends to a very important degree on the kind of trade relations we have with the United States and the degree to which Canada successfully holds its position, in principle and practice, as a supporter of expanding world trade and gradual easing of trade restrictions.

TOO MANY FARMERS

In farm forum members were asked to state their views on the question "are there too many farmers?" The South Freetown group had a concise opinion, "There aren't too many farmers but they are working too many hours." The other forum stated there aren't too many farmers if the speculators were taken out of the picture. The West forum was of the opinion that there are too many farmers in the West but that the Maritimes can have more farmers because of stable markets and a demand which exceeds the supply in many farm products.
