In a newspaper story that evoked wide interest, the first announcement concerning this boy, told of the generosity of a California businessman who made the operation possible.  
Later reports indicated another unusual feature when it was reported that hypnosis was used during the operation.  
The Summerside Lion's Club contacted the Lion's Club in the city where the operation was performed, and they volunteered to assist in any way possible to make his convalescent period more pleasant while there.  
Members of the family are jubilantly awaiting the arrival of the mother and son tomorrow evening in the happy ending to a story that for them had many anxious hours since they were last together.

### Prov. C.C.F. Plan For Argue Visit

SUMMERSIDE— Plans for a Summerside visit by CCF house-leader Hazen Argue, on October 9th, were finalized at a meeting of the CCF Provincial Executive on Saturday evening.  
Mr. Argue will arrive in Summerside on Thursday afternoon, October 9, and following a reception banquet by the CCF Provincial Council, Mr. Argue will address a public meeting in the Summerside elementary school hall at 8 p.m.  
A statement issued by the P. E. I. CCF Provincial Executive following their weekend, expressed "great dissatisfaction with the apparent apathy of those responsible for the unsatisfactory transportation situation which faces P.E.I. today."  
Noting the C.C.F.'s recognition of the need of a new ferry, and their efforts in this interest during the past two years, the executive statement, "again called public attention to the immediate necessity for a new boat of the Abegweit class, to replace the old S.S. Prince Edward Island."  
Noting the time required to construct such a trip, the statement by the CCF said that, "this emergency should have been anticipated action in this matter should have been taken long ago, and no further delay should result in this matter."  
The statement also said that the construction of this proposed boat would provide additional employment, "at a time when unemployment is still of great concern to many in this country."

### Five Cases On Court Docket

SUMMERSIDE—Five cases involving intoxication were on the docket before Magistrate R.S. Hinton, Q.C., here Saturday morning at Police Court.  
Residents of Belmont Lot 16, Clermont, St. Eleanor's, and two from Summerside all pleaded guilty to the intoxication charges and all were fined \$20 and costs.

### Fish Landings In Quebec Up

QUEBEC (CP)—Landing of fish and shellfish in Quebec during July were up more than nine per cent from those of the corresponding month last year, but the cod catch dropped slightly more than three per cent.  
The fisheries division of the Quebec bureau of statistics said 24,629,800 pounds of fish and shellfish were landed during the month, up 9.5 per cent from the July, 1957 total. They were valued at \$705,991, an increase of 9.7 per cent.  
During July, 18,998,500 pounds of cod were landed, representing a value of \$438,442—a decrease of 3.3 per cent in the catch, but an increase of 12.7 in value compared with the same month a year ago.

### Norfolk Bows To Court Order On Integration

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — Norfolk's school board, its time run out, Saturday night bowed to federal court orders and assigned 17 Negroes to six white secondary schools. The action automatically closed the schools and made idle 10,000 pupils.  
The board's action came within two hours after the three-judge U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, in an emergency session at Baltimore, refused to give Norfolk and Warren County another year to prepare for race-mixing in the classrooms.  
Within minutes of the Norfolk board's action, Governor J. Lindsay Almond Jr. released a proclamation saying the six junior and senior high schools would come under his direct control Monday, the day they were to open.  
Under the Virginia law, closure of a school is automatic once a member of one race is assigned to or enrolled in a school attended by members of another race. The proclamation by the governor is mainly a courtesy.

## New Book Says Princess, Townsend Still In Love

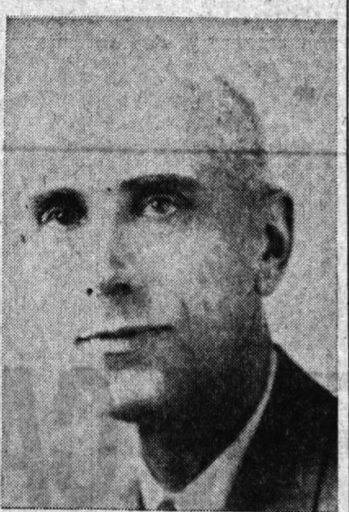
LONDON (Reuters)—A book to be published here Monday claims that Princess Margaret has pledged "undying love" for Group Capt. Peter Townsend and has told him that she will never marry anyone else.  
The author, Norman Barrymaine, a political journalist, is a friend of the 43-year-old airman whose frustrated romance with Queen Elizabeth's sister has made world headlines for years.  
In the book, The Story of Peter Townsend, he says the princess made her pledge as the lovers parted on the evening of Oct. 31, 1955. Then she published her decision not to marry him because of her duty to the church and Commonwealth.  
DEEPLY IN LOVE  
Barrymaine says the princess and Townsend still are deeply in love and are anxious that their love and friendship should be established in such a way that it is accepted by the court, the church, Parliament and the public. But he predicts that their story will not have the marriage and "happy ever after" ending of the fairy tales.  
Barrymaine says Townsend was unwilling to accept Margaret's pledge never to marry anyone else. He wanted her to find happiness and told her that while he was out of England on his two-year world tour he hoped she would meet someone she wanted to wed.  
When he returned early this year and met Margaret again both reiterated that the 1955 renunciation of marriage still stood.  
"WHY NOT SEE HER?"  
Barrymaine records that after

his return from his travels, Townsend said "he saw no reason why, for example, he should not take her to a theatre or a public restaurant."  
"As he put it, other escorts did so without criticism. Why shouldn't he?"  
But the publicity over their latest meeting, Barrymaine says, "aroused all the same reactions as before in the court. . . . New pressures were brought to bear on Margaret."

King George VI, Margaret's father, who brought Townsend into Buckingham Palace as an equerry, probably knew before his death that his daughter and the group captain were falling in love, Barrymaine claims.  
The Queen Mother was against the marriage. The Queen had to abide by her duty to church and state in refusing to condone the match. But if Margaret had decided to marry Townsend the author says, the Queen would not have indulged in recriminations.

## Snack Bar Owner Beaten, Robbed By Trio Of Men

Kicked, beaten, and robbed of \$118, Ted Perry, 56, Water Street Snack bar operator, on Saturday night was the victim of robbery with violence for the second time within a year and a half.  
Three men have been arrested in connection with the assault and robbery and are expected to appear in Police Court today.  
Mr. Perry was alone in his snack bar which is located in the McNeill Building beside Summerside Hardware and across the Street from Smallman's Ltd, when three men entered about 8 p. m., and ordered coffee.  
A few moments later two of the men held a whispered conversation near the entrance, and one of them snapped the lock on the door, walked quickly behind the counter and kicked Mr. Perry in the stomach, in commencing an attack in which all three men participated during the assault.  
Mr. Perry was struck about the face, head, and neck, and choked by one of the men when he tried to holler for help.

### STEAL WALLETS

As his resistance to the attack was overcome one of the men tore the wallet from his pocket and the three quickly fled from the premises.  
Two passers-by happened to hear Mr. Perry's call for help, and noted the direction in which the three had run down an alley way towards the railway tracks. Mr. Perry, despite his weakened condition, made his way to the street where his plight was noted by James Razavet and Walter "Bunsy" Burns, who quickly notified the police of the incident.  
Constables Harry MacKay, Elmer Matheson and Ralph Hardy commenced the investigation, and gave chase to three men they intercepted proceeding east on the railway tracks only minutes after the robbery occurred.  
Constable Hardy overtook one of the men he was chasing and placed him under arrest. A second was arrested by Constable Harry MacKay after the man had returned to his temporary lodging place and donned hat and coat in an apparent attempt to conceal his identity which had been recognized earlier by Constable

### ARRESTED IN CH'TOWN

The third man, a former native of Borden, had been released from jail in Summerside earlier in the day after serving a sentence resulting from a break made several months ago at the insurance office of Bill Young, next door to the scene of the Saturday Night assault and robbery incident.  
This man was arrested in Charlottetown later that night where he had proceeded by car from Summerside only to be delivered into the hands of Charlottetown police because the driver was experiencing difficulty in getting him out of the vehicle. Charlottetown police, only minutes before, had received word that this man was wanted in Summerside.  
The other two men arrested in connection with the incident are both from Glace Bay, N. S., but have been in the Summerside area on at least one previous occasion.  
It is understood that the man arrested in Charlottetown on Saturday night carried a sum of money amounting to upwards of \$100.  
Mr. Perry, whose face bears ample evidence of the violence used against him, was the victim of a similar attack about a year and a half ago, when he was attacked and robbed of more than \$200 in the garage of his home on Convent Street after returning from his place of business. In that instance, no arrests were made and none of the money was recovered.

## Fleming Asks Voters To Endorse Action Of Gov't

ST. PAUL, Que. (CP) — Finance Minister Fleming Sunday asked the voters of Montmagny, the federal constituency to endorse the 15-month record of the Progressive Conservative government including its "scrupulous respect for the constitutional guarantees of the French language and culture."  
The over-all record is one "not equalled in any similar period of time in Canada's history," he asserted in addresses at St. Paul and Montmagny on the eve of by-election balloting today.  
Mr. Fleming said that the riding, Liberal since it was formed 25 years ago, has another chance to align itself with the majority of Quebec voters and Canada.  
Fifty of Quebec's 75 seats were part of the Conservative total of 203 recorded March 31.  
He threw an "3-point list of charges at the previous Liberal government as evidence of their lack of foresight, vision and planning. Then Mr. Fleming, who speaks fluent French, ticked off these points as indications of government success:  
**TAXES CUT**  
Parliament has been transformed, taxes cut and civil service salaries boosted along with social service payments.  
Tight money has been eased  
**SCOTS CATTLE**  
Kirkcubright in southern Scotland is noted for the polled Galloway breed of cattle.  
**HISTORIC AREA**  
The year 1635 is recognized as the official start of the first colony in Connecticut, one of the New England states, cranes, put the water with their feet to aid their rise into the air.
