

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT'S PROGRAM

Some of the major activities in the Highway Department's program during the year have been:

- UPPER LEFT a section of pavement four miles in length between Margate and New London. This is a part fulfillment of the plan to have all roads leading to the National Park hard surfaced.
- UPPER RIGHT, a huge carryall moves fill for the West River Bridge. LOWER LEFT, is a section of a four mile strip of concrete pavement laid between Cross Roads and Mount Albion. LOWER RIGHT, attractively painted guard rails feature all curves and high dumps on the Trans Canada Highway. This is a curve in the road near Eldon.

Snow Problems Are Corrected By Highway Dept.

In an effort to eliminate snow traps on the highways of the Province, the Department of Highways during the last few days has been removing steep banks at various localities which have tended to catch and hold the snow.

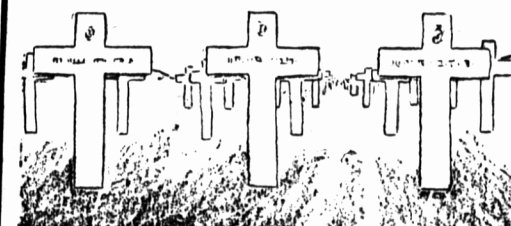
The perpendicular bank is sloped off after which the top soil is replaced so that no land is lost to the farmer. Highway engineers believe that by taking away the steep bank there will be no cause for the snow to lodge in some of the deep cuttings.

One place where particular trouble has been experienced is at the Water Works Hill. Sometimes it would take Departmental equipment two days to fully clear this stretch of road. On gravelled surfaced roads it is proposed to not only remove the sides of the cutting but to build up the surface of the road at the same time.

The work of widening cuttings will continue so long as weather conditions permit.

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P. E. I. Girl Guide Executive Meets

The November meeting of the Red Cross House in Charlottetown with the Provincial Commissioner, Mrs. Harry Cudmore, in the chair. The meeting was opened by the members repeating The Guide Law in unison, following which the minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

Reports were received from the secretary, treasurer and from the division and district commissioners. The division commissioners reported that, leaders having been obtained, several new companies are now operating, and requests have been received from other districts asking for information. Mr. Ian MacLeod Admitted To Bar

At a special sitting of the Supreme Court presided over by Justice J.G. Tweedy yesterday morning, Mr. Ian MacLean MacLeod of New Glasgow and Charlottetown was admitted to the Bar of Prince Edward Island. He is a son of Rev. and Mrs. W.J. MacLeod of New Glasgow, P.E.I.

In making application for Mr. MacLeod's admission to the Bar, Mr. R.R. Bell, Q.C. noted that the applicant was a graduate from Dalhousie Law School with a Bachelor of Laws degree. He also articulated for the past 15 months with Mr. Bell.

Mr. Bell said he felt Mr. MacLeod would be a great asset to the Prince Edward Island Law Society. He said he was happy to see one of the Island boys remaining in the Province to practice his profession.

Judge Tweedy welcomed Mr. MacLeod to the Bar. He said he had seen him at his attended sessions of the Court during the past two years and observed, "If you apply the same zeal and energy to the practice of law that you have given to the study of law, there is no doubt your career will be successful."

"It is refreshing to see a young man of your character and ability practicing Law in his native province," said Justice Tweedy.

Words of welcome were voiced by Frederic A. Large, Q.C. and Allison Gillis on behalf of the P.E.I. Law Society. Both predicted a bright future for Mr. MacLeod.

Present for the occasion was Mr. MacLeod's father and his sister, Mrs. Robert Schurman.
