

Giants Take Twin Bill; Athletics Blank Orioles

Expanding their bats and their tempers, National League-leading San Francisco Giants swept a doubleheader from Pittsburgh Pirates 5-2 and 6-1 Sunday. Manager Danny Murtaugh of the Pirates was ejected from the first game in the fifth inning after a 15-minute fracas. Vernon Law cut loose with a high pitch that dropped pitcher Ruben Gomez to the ground. That started it, Umpire Frank Dascoli walked out to the mound

to say something to Law, and Murtaugh dashed from the dugout to intercede. During the melee, players and coaches of both clubs emptied the benches, shoving, mauling and pushing their way toward Murtaugh, Gomez and the others near home plate.

Saturday, the pirates whipped St. Louis Cardinals 6-1. Cardinals split Cincinnati Redlegs, nearly stifled at the plate in the first game, exploded for a 7-3 victory over St. Louis Cardinals Sunday. The Cards had put nine hits to good use in the opener for a 4-2 triumph.

Cincinnati edged Los Angeles Dodgers 5-4 Saturday. A scheduled twin-bill between the Dodgers and Philadelphia Sunday was postponed by rain.

Bob Rush pitched Milwaukee Braves to a 5-2 victory over his former Chicago Cub mates Sunday and gave the world champions an even break in a doubleheader. Taylor Phillips, traded for Rush last December, shut out the Braves on six hits as the Cubs won the opener 1-0.

Philadelphia edged Chicago 5-4 Saturday and Milwaukee dumped San Francisco 6-3.

In the American League, leading New York Yankees had their 10-game winning streak nipped Saturday in Detroit, when the Tigers edged the Yanks 3-2. However on Sunday, the Yankees rallied and swept both ends of a

doubleheader from Cleveland Indians 6-1 and 6-3 by blasting a trio of three-run home runs off Indian pitching.

KEEP ON WINNING
The Tigers, meanwhile, flushed with their success Saturday, which ended a nine-game losing streak, went on Sunday and swept a twin-bill from Washington Senators 7-2 and 6-3.

Washington defeated Cleveland 6-3 on Saturday.

Luis Aparicio singled home Jim Land with the winning run in the ninth inning Sunday to give Chicago White Sox a 4-3 win over Boston after the Red Sox won the doubleheader opener 6-3 behind Ted Lepcio's three-run homer.

Chicago defeated Baltimore 4-3 Saturday, while Boston nudged Kansas City 5-4.

Ned Garver, aided by nifty fielding, shut out Baltimore on two hits Sunday as Kansas City

blanked the Orioles 4-0.

Garver fanned four and walked four in posting his sixth win against just one loss.

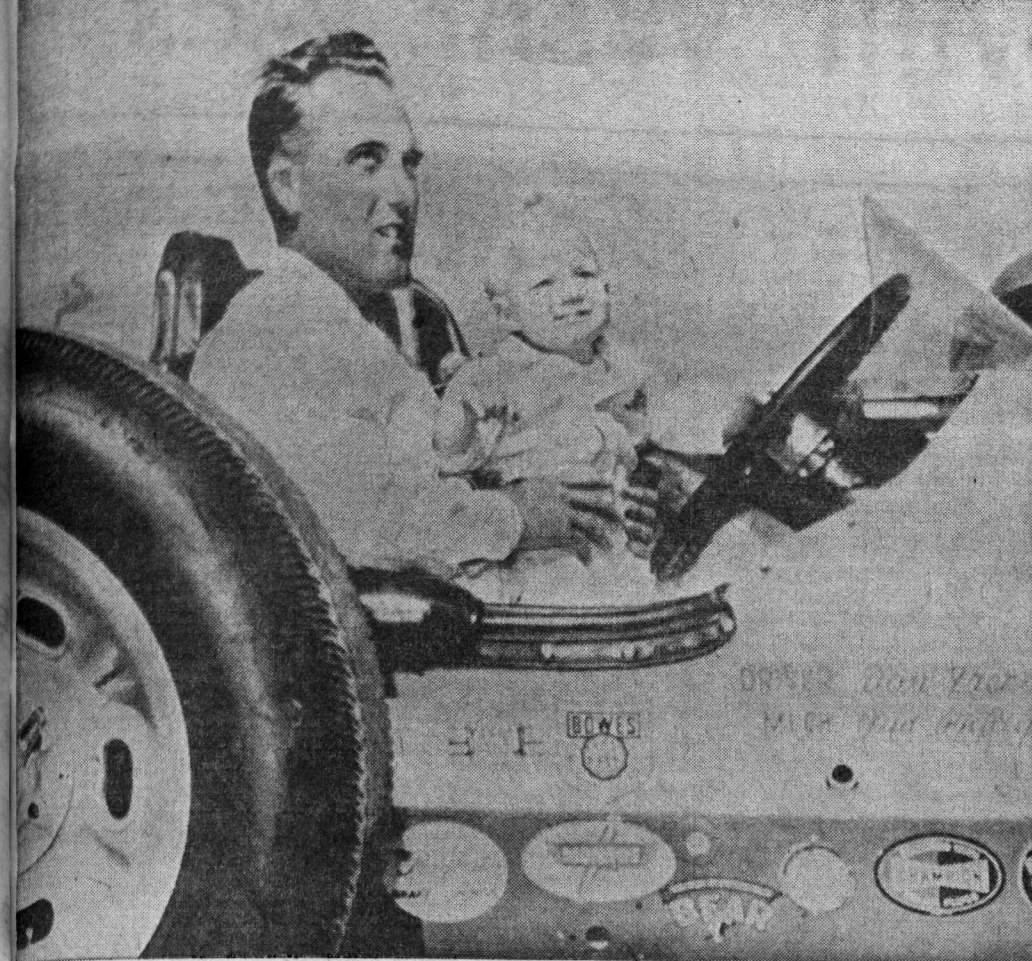

A former manager of Brooklyn Dodgers thinks the Los Angeles Dodgers may lose out on the Chavez ravine referendum on June 3.

The one-time Bums' pilot, Leo Durocher, now turned television expert, claims the club's public relations work has been "awful" and that even the Los Angeles papers are now against them.

The ravine question has been the subject of much debate with manager Walter O'Malley playing a prominent part.

O'Malley is excusing his players for their horrible start this season. He blames the Dodgers' slump on the uncertainty over where the team might be playing next year.

"We want to stay in Los Angeles but we can't if we have no place to play," O'Malley told a state assembly committee looking into the city's contract with the Dodgers.

Connecting the referendum with the Dodgers' slump, O'Malley said: "The uncertainty about their future worries our players, has caused a mass stage fright that I feel is back of our slump."

"The coliseum makeshift field scares them too," he continued, "but I feel everything will get better after the election."

Is Mr. O'Malley just whistling in the dark?

The threatened boycott of Detroit Tigers is supposed to come June 1.

That's the date set by a group of persons who want the Tigers to have a Negro on the roster by that time. Tigers play the Chicago White Sox at Briggs Stadium on that date.

The Rev. George Hill of Detroit, chairman of the boycott committee, said his group is trying to force the Tigers to sign a Negro by use of the boycott.

Detroit and Boston Red Sox are the only two major league clubs which never have used a Negro.

Danny O'Connell is just another one of those fellows who likes to come back to haunt former teammates.

Danny did it Friday night in Milwaukee—a place where he once performed for the much-loved Braves. Warren Spahn had a perfect game going when Danny came up in the seventh. Warren had retired the first 19 batters he faced and was on his way not only to a no-hitter but the biggest of all—a perfect game. Braves led at the time 3-0 when the Irishman drew a walk and spoiled the perfect game bid. Danny scored eventually to make it a 3-1 game.

Two more runs in the eighth evened matters and the teams went into the ninth tied 3-3. But O'Connell wasn't through yet. He led off with a single and romped home when Willie Mays came through with a home run.

Perhaps Danny remembered the wise cracks after he hit two more runs in one game earlier this season. Milwaukee writers thought that incident very funny.

Tony Cloninger, a 17-year-old Rock Springs, N.C., high school pitching sensation, may have received about \$100,000 to sign with Milwaukee Braves.

The scout who signed the youngster wouldn't say the amount he had got stating only he received a "sizeable bonus."

A representative of one major league system said that he dropped out when the bidding passed \$75,000. He figured the final amount was near the \$100,000.

Cloninger was signed to a Class AA contract with Austin, Texas, and immediately optioned to a Class C Northern League team.

He's a 210 pound, six-foot-one farm boy. He had a 6-1 record this season and pitched two no-hit, no-run games.

Leo Durocher led both Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Giants to National League pennants.

Now he's a \$135,000 a year man with the National Broadcasting Company and is viewing his two former clubs in this National League race. Giants are on top and Dodgers are at the bottom.

Asked his comments, the Lip replied: "The Dodgers are definitely not that bad a ball club. The Giants may not be that good. But if owner Horace Stoneham picks up another good pitcher—watch out."

Leo spends much of his time corraling top talent for television shows. He also handles the network's game of the week and keeps some watch on baseball.

One cabbie who seemed most anxious to talk blurted out in a manner to some of the world champions: "It seems like a lot of folks feel that baseball quit on them when the Dodgers left money-making spot to go off some place and make even more money. So now they've just quit on baseball."

He was warming up to the task when he exploded with this gem. "I was a Brooklyn fan for 35 years and I wouldn't walk across the street, to get into Yankee Stadium to see Casey Stengel walk on water."

Those old Brooklyn fans really die hard.
