REPORTS OF LIKELY REVISION OF THE BANK ACT WITH A PARTIAL LIFTING OF THE SIX-PERCENT INTEREST CEILING SPARKED BANKS.

Nova Scotia and Royal gained 1/4 points to 71 and 76 1/2 respectively. Montreal climbed 8/16 point to 62 and Canadian Imperial Commerce 1/4 to 66 1/2.

INDUSTRIAL VOLUME WAS 189,400 SHARES AND MINES AND OILS 929,800.

The industrial index added 1.59 at 161.34. Asbestos and CIL climbed 1/4 to 2 1/4 and 18 1/2 respectively.

UTILITIES ROSE 1.25 AT 142.41.

Treasury bills saw the week out up .01 to 5.11 per cent and 5.28 per cent in 91-day and 182-day bills respectively.

Provincials were 1/4 to 1/2 weaker in the long end. The municipal market continued active with \$408,000 County of York, Ontario 6-per-cent 1 to 10 year debentures awarded on a net borrowing cost of 6.37 per cent and re-offered at prices to yield 6.25 per cent.

The corporate market was fractionally weaker as quiet trading.

Students Hear Dragoon Band

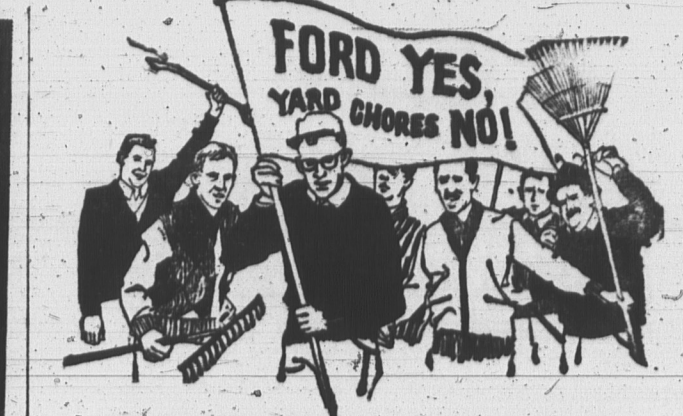

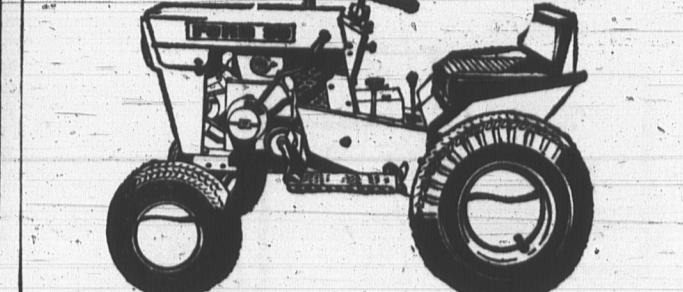
The band was introduced to the Montague audience yesterday by William Conkey, bandmaster who is liaison for instrumental music in the province.
