

Robert Douglas Armstrong Accepts New Presidency

By GORDON GRANT TORONTO (CP) — Robert Douglas Armstrong takes a challenge and he's taken on what will probably be the biggest test of his life—the presidency of the \$200,000,000 Rio Algom mining and steel empire.

The 50-year-old Ottawa native says he knows little about mining and steel, but they're the two major assets of the company he now heads. His lack of knowledge doesn't faze him.

"A business is a business, the object is to make a profit and if you can do it in one business there's no reason you can't do it in another," the soft-spoken executive said in an interview.

Mr. Armstrong said he could not make a decision on where to sink a mining shaft or where to look for ore, but Rio Algom, part of the world-wide Rio Tinto Zinc Corp. of London, has people who are experts in these matters.

He said the company now has no single major problem to overcome. "This cheerful outlook, however, is not shared by some Bay Street analysts who suggest that the company's Atlas Steels plant at Tracy, Que., is in trouble."

Opening lead—five of spades. The beginner often falls into the trap of taking a finesse whenever the opportunity presents itself. But this is a habit which experience teaches him to overcome.

Let's say you're declarer at six hearts and West leads a spade, which you ruff. Obviously there is a chance of losing a club and a diamond, so you put on your thinking cap to see what can be done to avoid losing both.

The first thing that strikes you is that if West has the ace

Mrs. Gandhi Completes 100 Days

By ADRIENNE FARRELL NEW DELHI (Reuters) — Indira Gandhi completed her first 100 days recently as prime minister of India with a reputation for confident leadership firmly established.

But the second 100 days will prove the real testing time for the slim, 48-year-old widow.

The critical summer months will show whether drought-ridden India, with food aid from abroad, can survive without widespread starvation before the next harvest.

They will show whether the country can increase its food production by 10 per cent—the target for this year. A good monsoon could set India on its feet again, a bad one would raise again all the problems posed by last year's monsoon failure.

The next 100 days also will

moving again after magnation following the conflict with Pakistan last year.

If Mrs. Gandhi can survive this second 100 days with the same confidence she has shown in the initial period, prospects for her and for the ruling Congress party stand high in the general elections next spring.

There have been criticisms of her regime from Congress party left-wingers such as former defence minister Krishna Menon. He said her policy is "lacking direction like flotsam and jetsam."

But the prime minister can claim credit for a number of achievements since she took office in January, following the sudden death of Lal Bahadur Shastri.

She has kept the peace with Pakistan, withdrawn Indian troops behind their own frontiers and reduced forces in disputed Kashmir state under the Tashkent agreement signed by Pakistani President Ayub Khan and Shastri, just before he died.
