LARGE ATTENDANCE. A VERY FAIR EXHIBIT.

The attendance at the Prince County Exhibition to-day was larger than at any previous occasions of the kind. The show of horses was good. The imported stallions were not shown, and were greatly missed. The show of cattle, sheep, etc., was small, but there were several very fine animals of each kind. The display of grain, vegetables, and fruit was good, but the competition was not so keen as in former years. At twelve o'clock His Honor Lieutenant-Governor Carvell and Mrs. Carvell and a number of the representative men of the County assembled at the exhibition building, where the Hon. W. G. Strong, on behalf of the Board of Commissioners, presented his Honor with the following address:—

ADDRESS

To His Honor the Honorable Jedediah S. Carvell, Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Prince Edward Island.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOR:

In the name and at the instance of my fellow-Commissioners, I have the privilege to bid you, as Lieutenant-Governor, a hearty welcome to Summerside, and to thank you for your courtesy in consenting to inaugurate and formally open our Exhibition.

We also desire respectfully to present our congratulations on your promotion to the Lieutenant-Governorship of the Province—a position of high dignity, and usually conferred on those only who have deserved from their country marked official distinction.

Your extended and most intimate acquaintance with most sections of the country; your knowledge of the avocations and aspirations of its people, will add to your other qualifications for the position to which you have been called, and will enable you to administer the public affairs of the Province in the manner best calculated to advance the general welfare.

These personal advantages, derived from an active life and experience of over a quarter of a century in the midst of our people and their industries, and the satisfactory record of your Parliamentary career, justify us in predicting that you will worthily fulfil the obligations of your office, and maintain, with becoming firmness, all its rights and prerogatives.

During the past season Summerside and other centres of the Island were favored with public discourses upon practical agriculture by Professor Saunders of the Dominion Experimental Farm.

In discussing his subjects, the learned Professor treated them in so lucid and interesting a manner that he won praises from all who enjoyed the privilege of attending his lectures.

Too much importance can scarcely be attached to the advantages that would be conferred upon the farming community and others if the Government would provide periodically for a course of lectures, by men of Mr. Saunders' acquirements, on farming, stock-raising and kindred questions; and we venture to hope that measures may be taken at an early day to accomplish so desirable an object. So far as Your Honor's personal and official influence can be invoked, we are convinced that your co-operation will be cheerfully given to this project.

Though the weather during the last two months has probably been a little unfavorable towards the complete development of agricultural products, it is believed, however, that we have abundant reasons to be grateful to beneficent Providence for the results of the husbandman's labors, and for the general blessings of the year.

Peace, prosperity and substantial progress prevail throughout the land, and we are undoubtedly on the road to greatness and to empire.

Repeating our good wishes for Your Honor's present and future happiness, and desiring our respectful regards to be conveyed to Mrs. Carvell, I have now to ask Your Honor to declare the Exhibition open.

To this address His Honor replied as follows:—

ADDRESS.

Mr. Chairman and gentlemen, Commissioners of the Prince County Exhibition:

I thank you for the hearty welcome you have given me on this my first visit to Summerside since my appointment as Lieutenant-Governor of this Province, and for your kind congratulations on my promotion.

You refer to my extended acquaintance with the different parts of the country. With every township may I not say with every school district—I have had direct commercial relations during the nearly thirty years of my business experience. Of course these relations afford opportunities for learning something of the "avocations and aspirations of the people." To promote the general welfare, and to protect, so far as in me lies, the rights of the people, shall be my aim.

With very great pleasure I have learned of the visit of Professor Saunders from the Ottawa Experimental Farm and would be glad to know that annual visits by him to our Province were possible. Much experience and benefit must result to our people from intercourse with one so thoroughly informed on all matters relating to farming, and who, by his genial manner and lucid explanations at once inspired the respect, confidence and appreciation of our farmers. Extracts from Professor Saunders' speeches and conversations have greatly interested me, and I am quite confident that his suggestions and advice acted upon would be of great and lasting benefit, not only to farmers, but to the Province at large.

I have always realized that whatever benefits the farmer, benefits me and benefits all the people, for is not farming by long odds the chief and most important interest we have? Are not the farmers really the backbone of the country? So it is of great importance that such advice as Prof. Saunders, in his short visit, has been able to give us, should be remembered as often as possible; and that our schools, which cost us so much, should afford that instruction, which is beyond all other instruction in value to a farming community that our young men, on leaving school, should be able to ascertain the qualities, the ingredients, so to speak, of the soils they are about to work the proportions of those components which the different crops take from the soil, and the knowledge of how to restore these properties. These and many other things necessary to intellectual farming should be taught in our schools.

Consider the many advantages that would follow, not only the direct immediate pecuniary advantages, but also the political and social gains which would be great if our

young men in the intelligent prosecution of their labors would take fond interest in their work, and would soon come to look upon their occupation as not only the most lucrative but as the most honorable and dignified to which men can give their attention. Then would our young men have less of that restlessness which too often results in their seeking other countries in which to labor. Then would we have fewer making the mistake of thinking shop keeping a more desirable calling; then would our Province rise to the high position which naturally it is fitted to occupy.

Has not Professor Saunders told us that in his travels from the Atlantic to the Pacific he has seen no better agricultural country; and has not our own experience in competing with our neighbors of the Provinces of Nova Scotia, of New Brunswick, and of Quebec shown that in the products of the farm we are, at least, their equal. Then I would say push forward and be at the very head of the list of provinces, and while rejoicing that ours is a land of peace and plenty try and realize the great blessings and privileges which are ours; the health-giving and invigorating atmosphere surrounding us, the rich, generous soil beneath our feet, and the best and most liberal form of government in the world. With all these we should, indeed, be prosperous and happy, and ever ready to thank God for his many great mercies to us.

With reference to the exhibit in the trotting park, I was very much pleased with the show of horses. This county has long given careful attention to horse-breeding, and a very good result, on the whole, is evident.

At the Exhibition grounds to-day, the show of cattle is not so large as I hoped it would be but there were several very fine animals, and I have been told that the exhibit of cattle is above that of last year.

Within the walls I found much to be proud of. I never saw larger and finer apples than some of those which I found here. And the grain exhibit is excellent. As to fruit, I have not in all my travels seen better apples, except in California, and the other varieties of fruit are equally good. I have not been able to examine many of the exhibits, the time has been so short, but I think that the exhibition to-day is highly creditable to Prince County.

For your kindly references to Mrs. Carvell, and your good wishes, I heartily thank you. I have very much pleasure in declaring this exhibition open.

Governor Carvell was also presented with the following address from the citizens, to which he made a suitable reply:—

ADDRESS

To His Honor, the Honorable Jedediah S. Carvell, Lieutenant-Governor of Prince Edward Island.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOR:

The citizens of Summerside would avail themselves of the present occasion to offer you their felicitations on your appointment to the distinguished position of Lieutenant-Governor of Prince Edward Island, and to welcome you in your official capacity to the capital of Prince County.

In common with the inhabitants of the Province generally, most of us are familiar with your career and character for upwards of 25 years as a gentleman prominently identified with the commercial and industrial interests of the country. In this respect your intercourse and influence have been not less beneficial than extensive.

In the discharge of your duties as a legislator of Canada we recognize in you a representative who entertained fair and patriotic views, and a well matured judgment on public questions, ever supporting measures of far-reaching and national significance.
