"WHICH IS HURT, THE DOG OR THE MASTER?"

SIR,—In a recent issue of the Patriot
newspaper there appears two communica-
tions about a certain resolution passed by
Eastern Gem Lodge, I O G T, in refer-
ence to the conduct of the Government re-
garding prohibition. The first of those
articles was evidently written by a little
clique of petty office holders, and has very
little connection with the question at issue.
The second article, however, demands
some notice. It appears quite evident to
my mind that the writer is far more anx-
ious to have a fling at the members of
"Eastern Gem Lodge" than to defend the
conduct of the Premier regarding this mat-
ter, and in biting at them, has, I fear,
severely bitten the hand of his master.

He has dared to decrease the fair name
of temperance by using the words "True
Temperance" as a *nom de plume* to an article
at variance with every principle of tem-
perance and fair play. It would be vain
for me to attempt to follow this erratic
scribbler all through his lengthy produc-
tion; but there are some statements
which I cannot let pass unchallenged.
He remarks incidentally that we are but
a small boy, and I would wish to say in
this connection that we differ in this par-
ticular from "True Temperance" (?) for he
has a large body, (especially the lower
part) but a very small head, and what is
more unfortunate, very little common
sense, as the article in question very
plainly proves. It appears that he has
puzzled over this matter more than little,
and has finally arrived at the conclusion
that the Premier has done right or he has
done wrong!

What profound reasoning?
Now we, sir, in common with hundreds
and thousands of temperance workers
throughout the Dominion of Canada, take
the ground that the Premier of Canada and
his Government has done wrong and
because we had the courage to say so, we
are assailed by anonymous writers who
dare not come out over their own signa-
tures. "True Temperance" takes great
pain to show the percentage of the vote
taken in September last, and places the
Premier in a very unfavorable
position by making the most astounding
declaration, that 55 per cent of the electors
having neglected or refused to cast their
vote consequently the Premier being a true
Liberal must bow to them and deliberately
set aside the expressed will of a majority
of nearly 14,000. Is this true liberalism?
Does the Premier intend to run the next
general election on the principle, "The
defeated candidate counts up the stay-at-
home vote and is returned no matter what
the majority polled against him may be?"

This is all bosh, all nonsense; and I do
not for a moment believe that Sir
Wilfrid Laurier ever enunciated
such a principle. It is contrary to
every principle of British fair play, con-
trary to reason, and must have emanated
from a dwarfed and d-d-raved intellect.

His reference to the brethren who com-
pose the committee taking a hand in the
next election is probably quite true, not
however with a view of becoming Minister
of the Crown, &c., &c., but it is possible to
place men there who would score to violate
every principle of justice and who would
never stoop to the mean, low tactics of the
present Ministers, not only on the Prohibi-
tion question, but the tariff question as
well. He asks who are those statesmen
who would dare to dictate to the Premier
of Canada? We would like to ask who
is the Premier of Canada? Is he Sultan
or Czar? Is he absolute or despotic, that
the temperance voters of Canada must
bow the knee in humble supplication. We
hope before this discussion is over to
place, not only "True Temperance" (?) but
Premier Laurier as well, in their prop-
er positions before the public. All we want
is to get this nasty little one out of his
hiding place, and the committee is only
too glad of the opportunity to do so.

Hoping that the committee's challenge
will be taken up and this matter fully

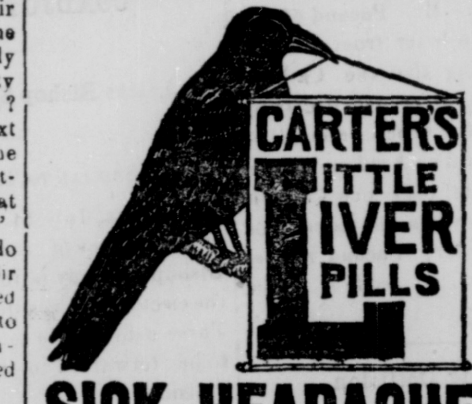
Annandale Anecdotes.
