**FRANK'S
 GARDEN
 ROTATION.**

Its Value is As Great Proportionately As
 in the Field.

A good rotation for the garden is this:
 Newly set strawberry bed the first sea-
 son and the next the bearing bed of
 strawberries. After that the strawberry
 plants should be started elsewhere so
 that they can come into bearing as soon
 as the old ones have yielded their crops.
 Clover should be sown upon the old
 strawberry bed after the plants are raked
 up. The following spring the clover
 should be turned over in time to make
 preparations for various garden vegeta-
 bles. If corn and potatoes are raised
 on a large scale they should be raised
 on a larger field separate from the gar-
 den, and they, by adding clover, make
 a rotation sufficient for all purposes.
 Two years of potatoes on one soil is
 sufficient. By the third year the bugs
 would be too plentiful to make things
 pleasant. Then give the land up to
 clover for one year, followed by two
 crops of corn. When the second crop
 of clover is harvested the potatoes can be
 planted again, and the rot, blight and
 bugs by that time will be exterminated.
 By this system of rotation we need less
 manure on our gardens. Some soils
 have too much manure now that is un-
 used, uncomposted and unassimilated
 matter. By a rotation crops of this
 kind will be better, and the land is cleaned
 out so that it can dispose of fresh applica-
 tions much better. Besides, clover
 adds to the soil what it greatly needs,
 and it is something that our gardens
 rarely receive. It may be impossi-
 ble to work small garden plots in this
 way where land is limited, but where
 the farm is large enough and the
 owner is depending upon his garden for
 most of his profits, there is no other
 sound, reasonable course for him to pur-
 sue. He must adopt a rotation of crops
 as well as his brother grain and grass
 growers—Germantown Telegraph.

HOUSEHOLD SURGERY.
 Some Little Matters that All Mothers and
 Housekeepers should know.

There are many little matters pertaining
 to the injuries and accidents which
 are constantly occurring in every house-
 hold which need to be reiterated con-
 tinually until every intelligent person
 has learned them by heart.

The first is, that the whole aim of a
 modern physician in treating wounds of
 any kind is to give the parts rest from
 any form of motion to keep the wound
 and all dressings absolutely clean in a
 surgical as well as a physical sense.

To this end the physician applies only
 what he knows has been boiled recently,
 he applies bandages and dressings which
 have been especially prepared "against
 germs," and if he has to use instruments
 of any kind, he carefully cleanses them
 by prolonged heating or other means.
 He also sutures particularly cleanses his
 own hands by the use of powerful anti-
 septics.

The doctor's work done, he may or
 may not leave any definite instructions
 as to what the mother or wife should do
 to carry out this line of treatment so
 that the wound may heal. Because he knows so
 well what to do, he often seems to think
 that the friends should know also, and
 forgets to make provision for the future
 treatment.

Usually the case goes on all right until
 the first dressing is changed. This the
 mother will do, because the bandage is
 getting dirty, or because of a great de-
 sire to see "how it is getting along."

Either excuse is utterly absurd, and
 the latter especially has often proved
 fatal to the patient. So long as there is
 no severe pain in the part, and no fever,
 always let the dressing alone for, at
 least, one week, and usually for two
 weeks.

To change the dressing on a serious
 wound is a serious business; on a trivial
 wound it may be only very annoying in
 its results. Why?

Because, unless you take the same pre-
 cautions as did the doctor in the first
 place, you will inevitably contaminate
 the wound with some form of impurity,
 healing will stop, and matter will form.

The severest and most extensive sur-
 gical wounds should ordinarily heal
 under the first dressing. How much
 more, then, a trivial cut or sore, provid-
 ing that the first dressing is of the pro-
 per nature.

If it becomes necessary, on account
 of pain, fever or discharge, to change
 a dressing on a serious wound, first pre-
 pare your dressing or bandage by boil-
 ing for half an hour in carbolized
 water, a teaspoonful of carboloid acid to
 a pint of water, to make the destruction
 of any germs certain.

Then, if possible, immerse the wound
 in the same solution, or bathe it with
 something else if possible. In this way
 contamination may usually be avoided.

The practice of doing up trivial cuts
 in their own blood, without washing, is
 usually a good plan where the cut has
 been made with a clean instrument.
 This is because blood, fresh as it is,
 is self-purifying, and after coagulation
 it holds the parts firmly to-
 gether, thereby placing them in a con-
 dition of rest.

Court plaster is very seldom a proper
 dressing for any of the most serious
 because it retards and contaminates
 the secretions from the wound.

Where it is necessary to use it to bring
 the edges of the wound together, let it
 be done by using long, narrow strips
 across the wound, leaving plenty of
 chance for any secretion to drain away
 and be absorbed by the prepared dress-
 ing before mentioned.

What shall be done with sores that
 are matting? These should have their
 dressing changed just as often as is ne-
 cessary to keep the discharge absorbed
 by the dressings.

Here we would remark that cheese-
 cloth, prepared as stated for dressings,
 is really the best dressing for household
 use, because it can be so readily steril-
 ized, and is such a good absorbent and
 it does not mat together in a hard bunch
 like even the best prepared cotton. It
 should always be prepared from six to
 twenty-four thicknesses, directly upon
 the wound, and usually covered by a
 sheet of oiled muslin, that it may more
 readily absorb the discharges.—The
 Household.

THE SPIDER FRIEND.
 Another natural enemy of the mos-
 quito and nature's greatest check against
 the uncleanly propagation of insect life,
 the spider. Spiders are, as far as man is
 concerned, the principal philanthropists
 of the insect world. Although there is
 a European spider (dathrodectus aculeus)
 with the reputation of giving a
 poisonous bite, and a New Zealand rela-
 tive (halpyscus) whose bite is supposed
 to have destroyed the lives of human
 beings—almost invariably natives—yet
 the majority of the outer araneida are
 undoubtedly harmless. The tales of the
 extraordinary result of the bite of the
 tarantula, and its remarkable cure by
 means of music, after prolonged langu-
 ing, are inconsistent with scientific
 truth. The bite of the tarantula may
 be extremely painful, but I am unable
 to find any reliable evidence proving
 it to be dangerous.

Spiders live upon insects, and conse-
 quently spend the greater part of their
 time in catching their prey; where mos-
 quitoes are plentiful, they form a great
 part of the spider's daily diet, and the
 web continues to do its work long after
 the owner's appetite has, for the time
 being, been appeased.

Cost of Feeding a Cow.
 The cost of feeding a cow has now
 come down to \$16 per year. This low
 cost has been made by one of the most
 successful dairymen whose income from
 each cow is never less than \$60 a year.
 This low cost of feeding is due to the
 silo, and the high value of the product
 of the cows is due to liberal, good man-
 agement and high quality of the pro-
 duct. And it is generally the case that
 the man who succeeds in making a
 valuable product is the most economi-
 cal in his business management—he
 makes at both ends, in fact.

The Best Meats for Children.
 The following represent the best meats
 for children in the order of their digesti-
 bility: Cold mutton, mutton chops,
 venison, tenderloin, sirloin steak, lamb
 chops, roast beef, rabbit meat and
 chicken. Veal, pork, turkey, goose and
 duck should be excluded from the
 children's bill of fare.

How to "Set" Colors in Cotton.
 Some housewives say that the colors
 of cotton fabrics will become "set" if
 salt and water is employed, three gills
 of salt to four quarts of water. The
 calico is dropped in the water while hot,
 and there remains until it cools.
