responsibility. The recent loss of your own baby has doubtless taken much greater toll of your health than you, at the moment, suspect. Take your time, but don't give up the idea.

One of God's greatest blessings, and one which, strangely enough, many people don't believe, is that we are not limited in our capacity for love. Though you probably will always have a shade more affection for your own child, it is the actual care and rearing of a baby that endears it to parents. So you'll learn in time that there is almost no difference—perhaps there will be none—in your feelings about the two youngsters.

I recommend for your reading a book that has the full approval of the Child Adoption Committee. It is called "The Adopted Family," is published by Crown Publishers of New York, and sells for \$2.50. The authors, Florence Rondell and Ruth Michaels, have written the book in two volumes—one for the parents and one for the child. You will find the work most helpful.

Good luck to you and your family; don't be deterred from your fine plans.

DEAR MISS DIX: Bob and I have been going together for several months. He is 17, I am 14. He claims I should prove that I like him by giving up all my other friends. Since I can only see him once a week, that means I would have to give up all other dates. Should I?

ANSWER: You are quite right to object; however, since you have already permitted him to kiss you in the movies, you'll have a bit of a job convincing him that you really do object. You must learn to make your conviction clear, even though you are bashful. Tell him you won't go with him again unless he behaves as you wish. He may get peeved for a while, but he'll get over it.

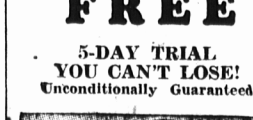
