Blood Donor Clinics Week Of April 10

Though the renovations on the building housing the Provincial Headquarters of the Canadian Red Cross Society are not quite complete, the staff have now returned to their offices after having carried on under difficulties from their own homes during the past two months.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Provincial Executive, presided over by Mr. R. H. Rogers, reports read by the Chairmen of the different Standing Committees revealed that the work of all departments has been actively carried on in spite of the difficulties encountered.

Mr. Edwin C. Johnstone, Provincial Chairman of the Campaign Committee stated that the 1950 Red Cross campaign had been delayed in this Province until the last two weeks in March so as not to conflict with the Y. M. C. A. and the Boy Scouts Campaign. Plans are now underway to canvass the rural areas begin canvassing just as soon as possible and to have the campaign in Charlottetown and Summerside during the week of March 27th.

In reporting for the Blood Donor Committee, Lt.-Col. Leo F. Macdonald announced that the Blood Donor Clinics will be held during the week of April 10th, at the R. C. A. F. Station, Summerside, in Summerside itself and Charlottetown when 900 donors will be needed. This is a very large allotment and will require a great deal of the kind of co-operative effort for which Prince Edward Islanders are famous.
