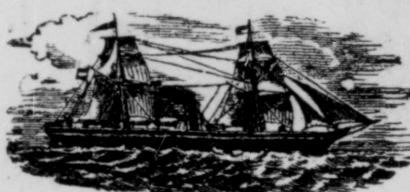

## SEYMOUR HAS REACHED PEKIN

### After Many Fights With The Chinese

WHO ATTACKED HIS COLUMN FIVE TIMES.

The Trouble Spreading Far and Wide Throughout China

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, June 21.—A despatch from Shanghai, dated the 20th, says that after an arduous march and frequent fighting with the Chinese Admiral Seymour arrived at Pekin Sunday afternoon.

On five occasions the Chinese attacked the column in great force. There were many mounted men among the Chinese but most of the natives were badly armed. At times they fought with admirable courage and bravery.

The losses of the Chinese during the march are estimated at 500 killed. The loss of the foreigners is trifling.

The exact state of affairs inside Pekin is impossible to describe in view of many conflicting reports. Nothing has been received from the legations or foreigners there.

Surprise is expressed at the fact that a large force of Indian troops has not been ordered there.

LONDON, June 21.—The Chinese rebel-

lion is spreading far and wide. The impression in diplomatic circles here and on the continent is that the allies have not yet grasped the situation effectively, and that even 50,000 troops would be powerless to do much to control the four million square miles over which the rebellion reigns.

## THE DISMISSAL OF LIEUT-GOVERNOR M'INNIS

Will Not be Announced For a Day or Two

## BRITISH ADVANCE STILL CONTINUES

### Penetrating the Transvaal Territory.

TROOPS HAVE NOW GOT AS FAR AS MACHADODORP

An Important Point on the Line to Delagoa Bay

LONDON, June 21.—The British have penetrated the Transvaal territory as far as Machadodorp. Passengers who arrived yesterday at Lorenzo Marques from the Transvaal assert that heavy artillery was engaged and that the Boers abandoned Machadodorp, retiring northward.

Kruger is still at Alkmaar. Boer bulletins regarding Dewet's operations along Roberts' communications assert that two convoys were captured and 300 workmen, with fifty military, taken prisoners.

Kruger's unstamped sovereigns have been offered for sale in Lorenzo Marques at twenty shillings. Advices from Pretoria, dated the 17th say that an official warning has been issued to the effect that any further wrecking of communications will be followed by the demolition of the farms for five miles on both sides of the line.
