NEW RELIGIOUS ORDER - A remarkable charter was recently granted by the Secretary of State to the American Co-operative Evangelical Association, of Kanopolis, Ind. The paramount object of this association is the speedy elevation of the human race, by education, in the grace of God and the highest type of manhood and womanhood. It is the belief of the members of the association that people cannot be good without God, and to that end the association is formed to send out evangelists, singers and musicians to secure the abolition of everything wicked. The association intends to print newspapers, engage in agriculture and most any odd jobs that turn up for the maintenance of the cause. ONE WAS ENOUGH - A blacksmith of a village in Spain murdered a man, and was condemned to be hanged. GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

LONDON, July 2. - Commenting on the downfall of Lord Rosebery, Truth expresses the opinion that the ex-prime minister would have made an admirable master of the horse, and that his epitaph should be: "Here lies Archibald Philip Primrose, 10th Earl of Rosebery, once Prime Minister of England. He lost twenty seats and won two Derbys." DUBLIN, July 2. - A meeting of the Parnellite faction of the Irish national party was held today, at which it was agreed to contest all likely seats in 24 out of 32 counties, and all boroughs except London derry and Belfast. CLEVELAND, July 2. - James R. Garfield was nominated by the republicans for the state senate at Warren today. He is a son of the late President Garfield, and received his first political honors on the 14th anniversary of the day on which Guiteau shot his father. DUBLIN, July 2. - A laborer walking through Boyne street this afternoon picked up a canister lying in the roadway. He attempted to remove the cover, when the canister exploded, instantly killing the man, who was riddled with iron pellets, with which the vessel was filled. The top and bottom of the vessel were connected on the inside by wire. The nature of the explosive contained in the can is not known. CHARLOTTEVILLE, Va., July 2. - A telegram from Elkhorn mining region indicates that the situation is hourly growing more serious. The 9,000 miners on strike are reduced almost to starvation, as many will be refused employment, and are growing desperate. Adjutant White thinks troops will be required to preserve order. The strike has lasted two months. PHILADELPHIA, July 2. - The authorities have caused to be torn down hundreds of placards which have been posted about the city asking the Bulgarians to assist in the revolution and appealing to Prince Ferdinand to send an army into Roumelia.
