Marine Ship's Urged By Aberton Delegation

The provincial government has been requested to provide a marine ship to improve ship-building and ship repair projects for the Aberton area.

Estimated cost of the ship is \$85,000.
The request was contained in a submission to Premier Walter P. Ship and Fisheries Minister Leo Rossiter, made yesterday by a delegation from the Aberton area. In the delegation were Phillip Koch, Ferry Rockford, J.W. Don Campbell, Rev. David MacDonald, Rev. Gerald Steele, accompanied by Welfare and Labor Minister Henry Wedge.

Mr. Rossiter said that the request will be discussed by the cabinet and pointed out that the government has already submitted projects to the Atlantic Development Board which include construction of slips in various parts of the province.

The delegation expects that it will receive an answer on its request to the government in about two weeks.

URGES PROTECTION
In its brief, the delegation said the existing boat building operation in Aberton needs protection in view of planned shipyard construction at Georgetown.

"You are bringing," according to the brief, "another boat building firm to Prince Edward Island. It is not of this province, so the industry here must have the protection of an agreement, whereby this new firm does not, and will not, manufacture or repair wooden vessels of any kind. It may manufacture only steel ones in this way, both industries can flourish."

Referring to present shipbuilding facilities in Aberton, the delegation said "we have a very modern establishment but give us equal aid and you will see our industry develop rapidly. We do not expect the same amount of financial aid as this new establishment, as it will be much larger. We want to grow gradually."

"When we complete the two contracts now under construction, we have an agreement with a firm from the Magdalen Islands to build 10 fishing vessels. We feel this is only a beginning and prospects for carrying other places such as Carleton Place, St. John's, Newfoundland also look bright."

WINTER STORAGE
The delegation pointed out that with the use of a marine slip, winter storage of large cruisers could be made a thriving part of business. "It is not only the winter storage but the job of restoring, repairing and overhauling these cruisers before they are launched again in the spring."

Pointing out that large wooden draggers are being used in the fishing industry, the delegation said "the knowledge that a vessel of this size it would also give us a chance for repair work on draggers, tugs and wooden druggers."

"It would mean a rapid expansion of the present shipbuilding facilities and would mean more employment for the people of the area. This employment is badly needed in Aberton."

Four of five members of the Thibodeau family sustained varying degrees of burns in the 7 o'clock blaze that gutted their home in Augustus Street.

A daughter, Janice, 12, had spent the night at the home of relatives and was not home at the time of the fire.

The blaze started when Mr. Thibodeau put kerosene on a Securus last night following a fire that gutted their home here yesterday morning. Both were being treated for second and third degree burns the attending physician said, "and could remain in the same condition for days."

A son, John, 10, who sustained minor lacerations and burns was reported to be in satisfactory condition last night, recovering from shock the physician said.

A second son, Wilfred, 16, was released from hospital yesterday morning following treatment for first degree burns and minor lacerations.

John and Wilfred were awakened by the screams of their father and jumped from the upstairs window. Mrs. Thibodeau, who had gone downstairs, was trapped in the hallway of the house. She was rescued when John kicked down a door that had been barred recently because of the hurricane.

The house, completely gutted and blackened on the outside, had \$2,000 worth of renovations, his past summer. All clothing and furniture was lost. No insurance was carried.

All three fire trucks from the Misouche department rushed to the scene and extinguished the blaze after the injured had been attended.
