The City Council.

A meeting of the City Council, with a full attendance of members, was held last evening, for the purpose of passing a by-law levying assessment on real estate and income in the city of Charlottetown.

COUNCILLOR MURPHY in moving the first reading of the by-law, showed that by levying a rate of assessment sufficient to meet the requirements of the city and have a surplus, they would be better enabled to reduce the debt of the city which was so much complained of at the present time.
