increased to 25 per cent from 15 per cent—applying to a long list of items, including new motor cars, radios, household electrical appliances, motor cycles, sporting goods, cigaret lighters, cosmetics, purses, luggage, fountain pens, watches and cameras. The tax—at the old 15 per cent—also goes on refrigerators, washing machines and stoves.

Revenue yield: An extra \$44,000,000 this year and \$54,000,000 in a full year.
The 30-per-cent tax imposed last September on candy, chocolates and chewing gum is being reduced to 15 per cent because it has been found to be "too severe."

The boost in the general sales tax to 10 per cent from eight per cent will yield additional revenue of \$105,000,000 this year and \$125,000,000 in a full year. It is being repealed on the drugs cortisone and acth. Fuels, building materials and 96 per cent of all foods are exempt from the sales tax.

By the use of another defence levy, the tax on corporation profits of more than \$10,000 is being boosted to 45.6 per cent from 38 per cent, retroactive to Jan. 1 last. Revenue yield: \$116,000,000 this year and \$175,000,000 in a full year. The corporation tax on profits under \$10,000 remains unchanged at 15 per cent. The tax boost will not be allowed to reduce company profits to less than five per cent of capital.

Tax deductions for exploration expenses for oil, mining and natural gas companies are being extended for another year while the three-year tax exemption for new mines is being extended to mines starting production in 1953 and 1954.

To curb the competitive scramble for scarce building materials and equipment, depreciation write-off for tax purposes is being withheld for four years on new non-essential construction or capital asset acquisitions.
Revenues for 1951-52 are estimated at \$3,730,000,000 against \$3,165,300,000 in 1950-51 while expenditures are estimated at \$3,700,000,000 against \$2,901,844,000.

The 16,500-word budget, while tough by Canadian standards, had none of the sting of the budget placed before the United Kingdom Parliament a few hours earlier. The British counterpart, a whopping \$12,381,150,000 budget, hoisted taxes on gasoline and doubled the purchase tax on motor cars, radios and television sets to 96-2-3 per cent.

He sharpened the defence phrases by calling the new increases in personal and corporation taxes "defence surcharges," and noted that spending will absorb \$1,664,000,000 of the government's total planned expenditures of \$3,700,000,000 in the current fiscal year.

He named three factors for the inflationary forces at present at work in Canada—the rising prices outside of this country, a domestic capital investment boom which shows no signs of abating and the fact consumer spending power is outrunning the supply of goods and services.

He reviewed the steps the government already has taken, such as curbing the use of credit, and had this to say of the rising clamor for the use of price controls: "If we reach a point where we believe a much wider range of direct controls would be in the national interest we shall use them, but we are not prepared to embark on a premature program which under present conditions would, in our judgment, create more confusion than stability."
