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DR. GLOVER IS OFFERED \$1,000,000 FOR FORMULA

And Permission to Place His Cancer Serum on the Market, Declares a Toronto Paper. Doctor Intends Carrying on His Work in Toronto.

(Special to The Guardian.) TORONTO, Jan. 4.—Dr. Thos. J. Glover, of this city, who has discovered a serum for the treatment of cancer which is being investigated by a special committee of the Toronto Academy of Medicine, with a view to a public report thereon, is said to have received flattering offers to go to the United States to follow up his work in relieving cancer patients. The Toronto Star Weekly states that a New York man has offered Dr. Glover \$1,000,000 in cash for serums.

On receiving a description of the man wanted at Pictou information was given by several persons which led to his arrest.

A NEW RUSSIAN TERROR HAS BEEN EVOLVED

Lenine Issues Proclamation Declaring Necessity of Organizing Strikes Throughout the World in Order to Prevent Countries from Injuring Russia

(Special to The Guardian.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—A new policy of terror abroad, especially in nearby countries, has been decided upon by the Russian Soviet, according to official advices from Moscow received today by the United States Government. Nikolai Lenine is quoted by the advices as saying in a proclamation to the Commune Committee of Europe that it is absolutely indispensable to keep the bourgeois enemy busy with internal troubles in order that they cannot injure Soviet Russia. Great strikes should be organized throughout the world. This version of the proclamation says an agitation for the establishment of commercial relations with Russia should be increased.

Criminal Movies Are Being Barred

(Special to The Guardian.) CHICAGO, Jan. 4.—Films portraying criminals at work have been barred here. Chief of Police Fitzmorris announced that movie censors have been ordered not to issue license for any photoplay that showed a crime committed even though the end of the picture might show the criminal in prison. The announcement was made when three youthful robbers said their crimes had been inspired by moving pictures.

How the Balloonists Were Rescued

(Special to The Guardian.) COCHRANE, Ont., Jan. 4.—The latest information in regard to the American balloonists who landed near Moose Factory on December 14, is to the effect that they landed twenty miles northeast of the post in a dense forest. Lieut. Klor stated that the party were lost in the wilderness for four days before their rescue was effected and due to the rather mild weather which prevailed at the time of their landing they did not suffer from freezing but were in good health when they reached the trading post of the Hudson Bay Co.

St. John Fend Positively Identified

(Special to The Guardian.) ST. JOHN, N. S. Jan. 4.—George Drew arrested and charged with attempted rape and doing grievous bodily harm to little Northrup girls in this city, before the Magistrate yesterday was remanded for further hearing. He was taken to the public hospital where the little girls are undergoing treatment and was positively identified by them as the man who made the fendish attack on them. The fend's being behind closed doors at the court fears what might follow should the public be admitted to the trial and learn the whole story.

LONDON, Jan. 4.—African cables indicate alarm by the nationalists at the increasing secessions from their ranks during the election fight and the growing strength of the South African Unionist coalition headed by Premier Smuts. Britain Secures More Oil Fields

(Special to The Guardian.) ATHENS, Jan. 4.—Great Britain has gained another lap in the world race for control of oil. This time American concerns, including the Standard Oil, were blocked when British companies and the Royal Dutch Syndicate were given concessions in the newly discovered fields of Northern Greece. The extent of the oil yield in Thrace and Epirus has not been made known but it is known that the grants are believed to be most valuable.

FEAR GREAT DEATH TOLL IN DISASTER

MADRID, Jan. 4.—One of the several boats which put out from Villagarcia to search for the wrecked steamer Santa Isabel, 2,488 tons, returned today with forty persons who had been rescued. The vessel was on her way from the Canary Islands with 200 passengers and crew when wrecked. The Santa Isabel was totally lost Saturday night on the coast at Villagarcia, near the Island of Salvoira. The boats from the Villagarcia began the search for survivors Sunday morning. Forty-five survivors from the wrecked steamer have been taken to Ribayra, a village on the Galician coast.

Captain is Rescued

The captain of the Santa Isabel was rescued, but was unconscious. Although official despatches are lacking, it is reported that many passengers and members of the crew were lost. The Santa Isabel went aground at four o'clock Saturday afternoon. Fishing vessels, which were despatched immediately from Ferrol and Corunna, found the steamer aground in shallow water with the funnel and masts visible. The Santa Isabel was engaged in coastwise service between Cadiz and Corunna. It is officially stated that all passengers on board were to tranship at Cadiz for Buenos Aires.

DUBLIN, Jan. 3.—The military raided the Convent of Carmelite Nuns at Ranelagh, a suburb of Dublin today. They forced the doors and made an extensive investigation of the rooms in the search for letters ad documents.

GREAT BRITAIN IS READY TO TAKE NAVAL HOLIDAY

According to a Washington Correspondent Britain is Prepared to Reduce Her Navy to the Level of that of the United States.

(Special to The Guardian.) MONTREAL, Jan. 4.—A Star special from Washington says, Great Britain is willing to surrender her historic position as "Mistress of the Seas" under pressure of her own economic and taxation problems, particularly her heavy debt. She is eager for a naval holiday. The discussion is attracting much attention not only in the United States, but in Great Britain and Japan. Britain is not willing however for the United States or any other nation to have a navy superior to hers. The rock bottom point of her willingness to concede is she will agree to limit her own naval programme to a point where her navy will be precisely equal to the power of that of the United States.

Present Home Rule Bill More Generous Than Any Previous Act. British Government Wants Peace but will Make no Compromise with Murder.

NEW YORK, Jan. 4.—Sir Hamar Greenwood, Chief Secretary of Ireland, made a statement on the Irish question the full text of which has been received by cable through the British Library of Information. Referring to current rumors as to the informal explorations of the Irish situation, Sir Hamar said "I make no statement except that so far as we are concerned we are out for peace and there can be no compromise with murder." DUBLIN DECLINES TO DISCUSS IRISH PEACE PROPOSALS

DUBLIN, Jan. 4.—By twenty-two votes to 15 the Dublin corporation at a meeting today declined to discuss proposals for an Irish truce. The negative vote came in spite of a strong appeal from High Sheriff Mr. Walter, who declared it was a "poor honor to De Valera for persons professing to be his followers to object to such a discussion."
