Day turned in three perfect rides on the Comet to give Canada the unofficial team championship by two points over the United States.

Riding since the final event of the week-long Penn National Day combined speed with precision to clear 10 hurdles without a fault and win the \$1,000 international individual jumping stake and President's trophy.

Day had to win it all to give the Canadians the team honor. Second, third and fourth place would not have been enough.

UNDER PRESSURE

Meico swept second, third and fourth-place honors in the final event, coming up with the best performance of the week. Jimenez edged teammate Joaquin P. de las Heras on Florida second place while Gerardo Rodriguez and Can were fourth.

Neil Shapiro, 19, for the United States was second in the individual standings with 4.0 points, 12 points behind Day.

In the unofficial final standings, Canada led with 62 points followed by the U.S. with 50 Meico 48, Argentina 14 and Brazil 10.

Canada's Team Places 21st; Better Facilities Needed

TOKYO (CP)—If Canadians want to reach more money, better facilities, more public interest and track more on this, they need to improve Canadian athletes in international competition.

At least that's the assessment Canadian officials gave before leaving for Sunday with one of the finest teams Canada has sent to the Olympics since the Second World War.

"Canadians can talk about physical fitness until they're blue in the face but I don't know how they are going to get it without proper facilities," said Jim Daly of Winnipeg, manager of the track and field squad that produced two of Canada's four medals and 14 of its 40 points here.

Canada got a hand medal in the coed pair rowing event, silver medals in heavyweight (800 and 800 metres), and a bronze medal in the 100 metres at the Tokyo games.

There were another point standings, compiled on a basis of 10-5-4-3-2-1 for the first six places in each event. Canada came 21st among the 94 participating countries with 40 points.

MOVED AHEAD
In terms of both medals and points, Canada took a sizable lead ahead from Rome, where in 1960 it won only one silver medal and collected only 16 points to place 26th among 84 countries.

Hul Gets Hat Trick; Hawks Defeat Rangers

NEW YORK (AP) — Bobby Hull scored three goals and Stan Mikita two, powering the Chicago Black Hawks to a 5-2 National Hockey League victory over the New York Rangers Sunday night.

Hull's third goal, a blazing 60-foot slap shot early in the final period, snapped a 2-2 tie and Mikita completed the scoring with a pair of goals less than four minutes apart.

Hull's last trick, first of the 1964-65 season, gave the all-star left wing five goals in his Hawks' first five games.

Mikita, the league scoring champion last season, assisted on Hull's last two goals, running his five-game point total to 12.

The teams traded goals in each of the first two periods before Chicago broke loose in the last 20 minutes. Rookie Jim Miklo's first NHL goal, scored while the Rangers were short-handed because of a penalty, put New York in front 1-0 in the opening period. Hull tied it on a 45-foot slap shot midway through the period.

Hull's second goal and one by New York's Rod Gilbert left it 2-2 after the middle period.

Each was scored while the other team had a man in the penalty box.

The Hawks peppered Ranger goalie Marcel Paille with 14 shots in the last period. Paille finished with 31 saves to 20 Chicago's Glenn Hall.

Referee Vern Carey ejected Rangers coach Bud Sullivan for arguing too long and loud after the last Hawks goal.
