## THE POWERS NOT ABLE TO AGREE

### Regarding the Treatment of Pekin Itself

#### SERIOUS RIOTING IS REPORTED AT AMOY.

Boxers Believed to Have Been Assisted By Imperial Officers.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER]

LONDON, August 29.—The inexplicable delay in forwarding telegrams from the Chinese capital continues. There is no confirmation from any source of the report of an advance northward from Pekin. On the contrary the movement northward to clear the country and to insure free communication with Taku is apparently in progress.

The Powers as late as August 21 were still unable to agree as to how to deal with Pekin itself, the Japanese and Russians being at variance as to whether the Imperial Palace should be destroyed. Nor is there any further news of the alleged detention of Li Hung Chang by the admirals. The probabilities increase that all the members of the Imperial household have got safely to the interior.

The Pekin correspondent of the Daily News, in a despatch dated August 17, asserts that there are thousands of instances going to show that the Boxers were assisted by the Imperial officers in their indescribable ferocity.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 29.—Rioting is proceeding at Amoy, and rich Chinamen are leaving.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—Uneasiness exists here in official circles over the seeming intention of some of the powers to depart from the original agreement and to enter upon the conquest of territory in China. They will be held to the note of Secretary Hay, of July 3, relative to joint action, and the open door policy will be insisted upon. Trouble is felt to be brewing.

### Effect of Jug-Handled Preference.

OTTAWA, August 28.—The Italian consul-general for Canada has notified the Canadian government that the government of Italy will in future apply the general tariff of Italy to products or manufactures of Canadian origin and that Canadian shipping will be excluded from the privileges granted to other states in matters of navigation.

### Bresci Tried Suicide.

LONDON, August 28.—Bresci, the assassin of King Humbert, ineffectually attempted to commit suicide Sunday, according to a despatch from Rome to the Daily Mail. He now refuses food, saying that he has no intention to give the court the satisfaction to see him condemned. He shows signs of aberration of intellect.

## THE SHOOTING AT RIDEAU RANGE

### Good Scores Made by As Marksman.

#### SERGEANT-MAJOR BAIRD IS AMONG THE PRIZE WINNERS

Sergeant Hayhurst is Able to Take His Place.

OTTAWA, Aug. 29.—The second day of the Dominion Rifle Association shooting opened in weather conditions which were well nigh perfect.

Sergeant Hayhurst, who had his eye hurt with a bottle, has had it fixed up so that he has been able to shoot, using the injured eye.

The Dominion of Canada match was won by Private Spencer of the 48th Highlanders, who made 99 points. Sergeant-Major Baird, Charlottetown, won \$6.

The Davies cup for battalion teams was won by the Royal Grenadiers, who totalled 574 points.

In the extra series, five rounds at six hundred yards, 29 men made possibles, giving each man 484.

#### LATER DESPATCH.

OTTAWA, August 29.—In the Dominion of Canada Match, Lieut. Lordy made 95 points and won \$6. Sergeant-Major Baird also made 95 and won \$6.

The following men won prizes of \$5 each, making 94 points. Corporal George Blue, Bandsman Kennedy, Pte. J Weatherbie, Lieut J M Davison, Sergt J A Moore.

Capt M A Allan was counted out with 91 points.

In the Dominion of Canada tyros Sergt C A Lawson made 91 points and won \$4. Lieut V L Beer made 90 points and also won \$4.

#### BAPTIST CONVENTION

Missionary Reports — Where the Money Goes

HALIFAX, N. S., August 28.—At the opening session of the Baptist Convention yesterday, Rev. G. O. Gates presented a report on home missions for New Brunswick.

The statement of the treasurer showed that the receipts amounted to \$1,331.81; grants to mission fields and expenses, \$284.41; balance paid to New Brunswick convention, \$1,047.40. The report was adopted.

The report on missions in the Northwest was presented by R. v. G. W. Schurman. The past year had been one of the most encouraging in the history of the work. The college at Brandon has been opened with an enrollment of 100 students. Contributions to the Northwest missions from the Maritime Provinces were: Nova Scotia, \$961.31; New Brunswick and P. E. Island, \$923.63; Woman's Missionary Union, \$605.94; collection of Mr. Vinning, \$2,864.90.

J. W. Manning presented the report of the Foreign Missionary Board. The past year had been one of unusual interest to the workers at home and abroad, and has been attended with unusual encouragement, but these have been offset by unusual trials. Sickness and death have been at work, and there are vacancies waiting to be filled. The total amount raised during the year for foreign missions was \$20,884.59, of which \$3,000 was contributed by J. W. Bars, and \$2,000 by friends in Sydney. The amount contributed by Nova Scotia churches, \$2,687.14; New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island churches, \$1,524.83; special pledges at the convention, \$1,431.52. The legacies during the year amounted to \$983.80. Total receipts, \$20,844.59; expenditures \$19,875.31; deficit, \$2,389.12; total, \$22,264.43. This leaves a deficit of \$1,419.84. At the conclusion of this report, Mr Manning announced that he had received a message from the Woman's Missionary Union, lately in session at Windsor, that they had voted \$1,450 to the Foreign Mission Board. This more than covers the deficit.

At the afternoon session Mr Manning reported on moneys received from the churches of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island as follows: Total receipts, \$6,352.79; amount contributed by Woman's Missionary and Aid Society, \$2,928.18; total, \$9,280.94.

## LORD ROBERTS SUCCEEDS WOLSELEY

### As Commander-in-Chief of Army.

The address was delivered in the public gardens last night. There was a heavy rain falling, but notwithstanding this fact a large crowd attended.

#### Almost a Tornado.

SEDALIA, Mo, Aug 27.—A storm bordering closely on a tornado struck this city this afternoon. Three buildings on Main street were blown down, Wood's opera house practically unroofed and dozens of smaller buildings were damaged. Street car traffic was suspended. There was a terrific fall of rain, and the water in many of the streets ran up to the doorsteps of the residences. No loss of life is reported.
