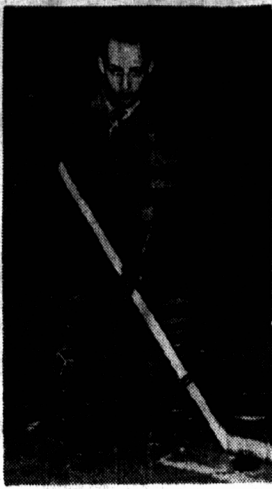


# Islanders Score Three Times In Third Period To Defeat Sydney 4-2

Buck Whitlock, the greatest goal scorer in the Maritimes during the past decade, deflected two shots behind goalie Normie Defelice in the third period last night to give the Islanders a 4-3 win over the Sydney Millionaires in a well played M.M.H.L. game at the Forum.

## Two Big Goals



Whitlock's two goals broke up a 2-2 deadlock and split the Millionaires' chances to gain ground on the first place Halifax Atlantics. The win, the second for the Islanders over the Millionaires in as many games, moved the Trainers to within two points of the Glace Bay Miners.

The Millionaires, playing one of their best games on Charlottetown ice, went into a 2-1 lead during the first period on goals by Gordie Cowan and Specs Chorley. The second period was scoreless and the Islanders came from behind to score three times in the final twenty minutes.

Both teams went all out to win. Well rested from their week-end holiday the players skated at a terrific pace. The checking was close and the body contact rough in a game that produced play-off hockey.

Whitlock scored both his goals on identical efforts. A master of the deflection art, he got his stick in the way of 30 foot drives by Vip Palladino and Orin Carver, deflecting both shots past Defelice.

Defelice and Roger Bessette were superb in their work as goaltenders. Bessette kicked out 19 shots and Defelice 22. The Sydney goalie had 10 stops in the final period as the Islanders put on the pressure.

The Millionaires held an edge on play during the first two periods while the Islanders took over in the third. After building up their two goal lead the Islanders set up a defensive barrier that the Millionaires could not break.

Claude Robert, the best man on the ice for the Islanders during the first two periods opened the scoring early in the game. He knocked down a pass from Saindon at the Sydney line and broke away to drift a 20 foot knee high shot past Defelice.

Gordie Cowan raced in from left wing to catch a pass from Roger Dubuc and tie the score on a shot from 10 feet out. Reardon started the play with a pass up to centre and Dubuc knocked the puck over the blue line for the speeding Cowan.

Defenceman Ted O'Connor set up Specs Chorley for the Millionaires second goal. Andy McCallum got the puck into Sydney territory and passed to O'Connor at the red line. He skated to the Islanders defense and put Chorley in the clear. Chorley's shot glanced into the net off Bessette's glove.

There was no scoring during the second period. The Islanders consistently missed the left hand corner of the net and when they did get their drives on the target Defelice got in the way.

George Robertson, playing a standout game for the visitors, had one of the Millionaires' best chances of the period. He raced in on the left wing side but failed to draw Bessette. Bessette also came up with a nice stop of Chorley.

Lorne Pirie drew a penalty for holding Orin Carver late in the second period. He was still in the penalty box during the early part of the final period when defenceman Don McLaughlin scored the tying goal.

Coach Bucko Trainor did the spade work as he centered the puck off the backboards onto the side of the Sydney net. The uncovered

McLaughlin pulled the puck out from under and shot the disc through Defelice's legs.

Orin Carver checked the puck off Roger Dubuc's stick to set up Whitlock's first goal. Palladino got the puck along the side boards and Whitlock deflected the 30 foot drive into the net Sydney for the winning goal.

Carver skated out of the corner before drifting another 30 foot shot that Whitlock deflected for the final goal of the game.

### Cuff Staff

The Sydney defense pair of Andy McCallum and Ted O'Connor was very solid. A hard hitting unit they rank high among the best defensive units in the circuit. McCallum, who can block as well as he can hit, is a second goaltender for the Millionaires.

Paul Saindon is having tough luck of late around the opposing net. He has missed several minutes of the game he hit the post and set up Spike Laliberte but Defelice came up with a smart save to prevent any further scoring.

Claude Robert was struck on the side of the nose by Duke MacDonald's stick in the second period. Robert claimed that he never saw so much high sticking as he did last night.

Millionaires coach Terry Reardon alternated with Specs Chorley on the forward line. He turned in a strong game but drew the abuse of the fans as he swung his stick towards Harry Sentner of the Boosters Club in the second period. Harry was back on his feet yesterday after being confined to bed with the flu for several days.

Millionaires have strong centres in Robertson and Cowan. Robertson has looked better this year than at any time since he came to the Maritimes. Had Dunc MacIntyre been up to par last night Robertson might have clicked for a couple of points.

Larry Blackburn broke up a dangerous Cowan-Chorley play in the dying minutes. Larry just managed to get his stick in the way of the puck and his fine defensive effort wiped out a Sydney chance to get back in the game.

The Islanders drive to Sydney today for a game with the Millionaires. Tomorrow night on the way back they will play an exhibition game with St. F. X. at Antigonish.

## Patterson Outpunches Durelle In 8-Rounder

BROOKLYN, N. Y., (AP)—Undeclared Floyd Patterson scored his 10th straight victory Monday night by outpunching Yvon Durelle, former Canadian light-heavyweight champion, in an eight-rounder at the Eastern Parkway Arena. Patterson weighed 167 1/2, Durelle 170 3/4.

The 19-year-old Brooklyn Negro was a 4-1 favorite. Although he won a unanimous decision he was far from impressive.

The votes, all for Patterson, were: Referee Abe Simon, 5-2-1, and Judges Joe Eppy and Leo Brunbaum each 5-3. The AP scorecard had Patterson in front 6-2.

Patterson had the eighth round taken away from him by the referee because of several rabbit punches.

### Patterson Hit Often

Durelle, from Bale St. Anne, N. B., a 24-year-old soldier on leave from the Canadian Army, was only the third fighter to go the distance with Patterson since he turned pro after winning the 165-pound Olympic title in 1952. Patterson has won his other seven fights by knockouts.

The hard-punching youngster missed more often and was hit more often than in all his other fights put together. He found the awkward, bobbing and weaving Canadian hard to hit at times and at other times almost landed at will.

Patterson shook the strong-lezged Durelle several times during the free-fighting battle but couldn't bring him down. He connected with some of his hardest blows but Yvon took them well.

Durelle drew blood from Patterson's nose in the second round. He traded willingly with Patterson throughout most of the fight but wound up losing most of the swaps because of Floyd's rapid-fire punching.

### Durelle's Fifth Loss

Twice Patterson missed so badly he almost fell to the canvas. It was the fifth loss for the lantern-jawed Canadian. He claims he has won 100 fights although the record book shows only 20 victories for him.

A crowd of 3,000 paid an estimated \$3,500 for the televised bout. The bout was limited to eight rounds because of Patterson's age. Boxers under 20 are limited to eight rounds in New York State.

The many Prince Edward Island friends of Alan Stuyvesant of Allamuchy, New Jersey, will be grieved to learn that he was injured on board ship, enroute to France, and that he died last Tuesday in Paris.

The late Mr. Stuyvesant was best known here for his great interest in field trials and hunting dogs. He was a strong supporter of the trails held by the Charlottetown Kennel Club and was either a competitor or judge in most of the events. He was internationally known as one of the foremost breeders of Brittany Spaniels and it was through his efforts that the Brittany has become so well known and popular in North America. He was a former President of The American Brittany Club.

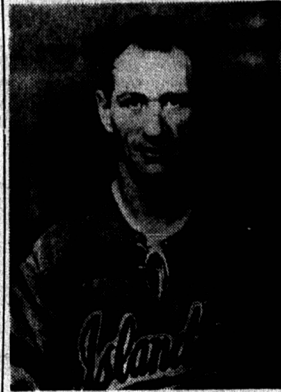
During the second world war Mr. Stuyvesant joined the British Army at the outbreak of hostilities and served with an ambulance unit overseas. He later became a member of the French Resistance before joining with the American forces when the United States entered the war. He was wounded in service and a prisoner of war for nearly a year. Alan Stuyvesant typified the finest type of sportsman. He loved sport for sports sake and always put more into it than he took out. His like will be hard to find.—F.A.S.J.
