James Bond, Astronauts Influence Christmas Toys

MONTREAL (CP) — James Bond and the astronauts exerted the strongest influence on the toys shown at the Canadian Playthings Manufacturers' ninth Christmas preview here.

The association of more than 130 Canadian toy makers attributed the popularity of secret agent equipment and science and space toys to children's increasing interest in the world around them.

Asked if he thought the James Bond craze was an undesirable thing to encourage in children, Dennis E. Tiberis, vice-president of the association, said he feels such toys have "no significance in the moulding of their character."

He said children's eagerness to play with violent toys is not a problem for the toy manufacturer, but for the psychologist. "The toy people are just filling a need that has been created by other media and by our society." He suggested adults are doing "everything possible to glorify war."

WOULD DEGRADE WAR

Mr. Tiberis said children will have to be taught to hate war from their earliest years if the trend to aggressiveness is to be reversed. Schools, for example, would have to change the method of teaching history and degrade rather than glorify famous war victories.

Bank Deposits Show Decline

OTTAWA (CP) — Currency and chartered bank deposits held by the general public were reduced in this month after a three-week climb seemed to indicate a further marked expansion of the money supply.

Statistics reported here by the Bank of Canada, probably reflecting purchases of Canada savings bonds during the first 10 days of November, showed a reduction of the publicly-held deposits and currency to \$19,078,000,000 on Nov. 10 from \$19,354,000,000 on Nov. 3.

Money paid to government accounts for the bonds reduces the public supply. This all but wiped out an increase which had been building up since mid-October.

The money supply rose sharply during the summer, following default of Atlantic Acceptance Corp. on its bonds, and banking sources have indicated this was encouraged by the central bank to cushion the effect on money markets of uncertainty caused by the troubles in Atlantic Acceptance and Trust Co. During the early fall months, the rate of increase in the money supply returned to a more normal trend.

While Thursday's report indicated the general public had less money in its hands and on deposit with the chartered banks last week, the cash reserve position of the chartered banks appeared stronger this week.

Under banking legislation and regulations, the chartered banks are required to keep eight per cent of their Canadian dollar deposit liabilities in the form of cash and deposits in the Bank of Canada.

THIEF TOOK TOO MUCH

TOKYO (AP) — Success spoiled the record of Sadahiro Goto, 24, eight times convicted of burglary. After breaking into a department store, he learned that the jewelry he stole was worth \$5,500. So he gave himself up. "That's more than I ought to have taken," he said, explaining he had been drunk at the time.

Cholesterol Is Described Not All Bad

WINNIPEG (CP) — A Canadian biophysicist says the complete condemnation of cholesterol as harmful to human health is unfortunate.

Dr. Alan C. Burton, professor of biophysics at the University of Western Ontario, London, said in an interview here during a heart symposium that medical men should make clear to the public that cholesterol is needed.

Cholesterol is contained in many fats and protein foods, and excessive quantities tend to clog the blood vessels.

Dr. Burton said "it so happens that the body needs cholesterol to build up its membrane tissues. Also, blood fat is the food your and my heart muscles prefer as nourishment."

"Fully two-thirds of the nourishment of the heart and other muscles in the body is supplied from fat and not from carbohydrates."

Expo 67 Urges Moderate Rates

MONTREAL (CP) — Jacques Belanger, co-ordinator of accommodation for the 1967 Montreal world's fair, has called on hotel and tourist house operators to keep their prices reasonable during Expo 67.

If prices are inflated unduly during the world's fair, he said at a press conference Wednesday, it will give the city a bad name with tourists for years to come.

Generosity and courtesy, on the other hand, would pay dividends.

Mr. Belanger said accommodation rates will not be controlled artificially during Expo, and it is to be hoped that prices will not be increased by more than five to 10 per cent.
