Opening lead—king of hearts.
 An extraordinary line of defense succeeded in defeating declarer in this hand played in a rubber bridge game.
 West led the king of hearts on which East played his jack! The East-West pair were zealous disciples of the suit-directing convention, a method of defense which frequently conflicts with the age-old custom of playing a high card when it is desirable to have a suit continued and a low card as a stop signal.
 West decided that it was impossible for East to have started the hand with only a singleton or doubleton jack of hearts, because this would mean that South had been dealt either five or six hearts, a possibility that was not consistent with South's bidding. West interpreted the jack of hearts play as a signal for him to shift his attack elsewhere, specifically to the higher ranking of the two side suits, diamonds and clubs.
 He led a diamond. Declarer, conscious of the danger with which he was now faced, took the diamond in dummy and led a low trump.
 East did not wait. He rose promptly with the ace of spades and returned a heart to West's ace.
 Backing his judgment of what he conceived to be the actual situation, West took the ace of hearts and returned a diamond. East ruffed, giving his side its fourth defensive trick, and the contract was down one.
 It was a delicate operation, carried off successfully. East's imaginative defense could not have succeeded without perfect cooperation by West. As so often happens in defensive play, the triumph was one of partnership rather than of individual accomplishment.
 Without the jack of hearts play on the opening lead, declarer would almost surely have made the contract. If West had continued at trick two with the ace of hearts or made the normal shift to the ten of clubs, declarer's chore would have become an easy one. He would have lost two hearts and a spade and scored ten tricks. But brilliant defense made South's cause hopeless.

28 CNR Mechanical Shops Accident Free During '58

MONCTON — Twenty-eight Canadian National Railways mechanical shops from Quebec to Newfoundland have the distinction of having completed the entire year 1958 without a single lost-time accident, it was announced here yesterday by D.W. Kyle, safety supervisor of the CNR's Atlantic region.
 The various mechanical establishments, comprising units of the railways' motive power and car equipment departments, are located in Newfoundland at Port Aux Basques, Humbermouth, Bishop's Falls and Clarenville; in Nova Scotia at Sydney, Halifax, Bridgewater and Stellarton; in Prince Edward Island at Charlottetown; in New Brunswick at Saint John, Newcastle, Campbellton, Edmundston, and South Devon; in Quebec at Riviere du Loup and Mont Joli.
 The Hicks and Danter awards for the best safety performance for the year were won by the roundhouse at Halifax and the CNR department at Edmundston, respectively, these having worked the greatest number of man hours without accident.
 The awards are donated by H. H. Hicks, general superintendent of motive power and car equipment for the Atlantic region, and by W.E. Danter, regional assistant to the employees of the winning departments.

Big Step-Up Seen Possible In British-Russian Trade

LONDON (AP)—A big step-up in British-Soviet trade emerged Sunday as a possible product of Prime Minister Macmillan's mission to Moscow.
 Diplomatic informants expressed belief the Russians might repeat their spectacular offer of three years ago. Then, Soviet leader Khrushchev presented a "shopping list" totalling close to £1,000,000,000.
 Macmillan will arrive in Moscow Saturday. He calls his visit a reconnaissance trip to sound out Soviet thinking.
 Khrushchev made his trade offer during his visit to Britain in 1956. And although it led to an increase of trade it never reached the level Britain would like.
EMBARGOED GOODS
 One reason was that more than 40 of the 87 products Khrushchev wanted to buy were on NATO's embargo list of strategic goods. Another was that the Russians wanted credit for articles Britain then could sell readily only for cash.
 Now the picture has changed. With unemployment rising, the Macmillan government is looking for markets, and the U.S.S.R. is a much more accessible market than it was.
 Largely under British pressure, NATO revised its embargo list last August.
 Next, the Russians have stepped up demand for plants for the food and consumer industry, which never were on the embargo list.
