The Institute was started in Toronto 38 years ago and now has branches all across Canada. The Maritime Divisional office is in Halifax from where Home Teachers are sent out to instruct the blind in various handicrafts.

An example of this is Miss Mary Sutherland, who having lost her sight in the Halifax explosion of 1917, graduated from the Halifax School for the Blind and then from the Toronto home-training school. Now she travels about the Maritimes showing the correct methods of instruction in such skills as braile - reading, typing, leathercraft, chair caning and home economics. This enables blind people to be self-supporting, she says, both in making a livelihood and in their recreation hours.

There are now on the Island 178 blind persons. Contributions received from people of P. E. I. will be used in the provision of worthwhile services to the sightless residents of this province and the happiness brought into the lives of blind men, women and children by the C. N. I. B. will bring pleasure in the knowledge that you have contributed to make it possible.

Mrs. Nash, reporting for the scholarship class, announced a number of new scholarships in Junior piano, junior vocal, folk songs, piano duets, and recorder classes.

The names of the adjudicators for the 1957 festival were presented to the meeting for approval. They are: Dr. Leslie Bell, Toronto, Ontario; Mr. Reginald Geen, Ottawa, Ontario; Mr. Edward Smale, Bramford, Ontario; Mr. Edward Collins, Wolfville, N.S.

Mr. Mugford reported the school syllabus ready for printing and sufficient music for these numbers is already on hand. The local music stores, Miller Bros. and A. E. Toombs, have kindly consented to handle the music at a service to the public. In discussing the choral work in the schools, it was decided that the work in Grades 1, 2, and 3 would be on a non-competitive basis this year.

In the report of the Membership committee, presented by Mrs. Lorne Calbeck, it was learned that new memberships had been received from several Women's Institutes on the Island.

The Choral Reading committee reported their syllabus complete. It contains two additional classes, one for church groups and one in French poetry.

It was agreed that much confusion would be avoided in the "Stars of the Festival" concerts if two separate and different programs were presented in Charlottetown. This would eliminate the necessity of performers rushing from one hall to another to present their numbers.

It is expected that the next meeting of the executive will be held in Montague during the latter part of November.

The meeting adjourned after the President, Mr. Gordon Bennett, had expressed the thanks of all present to Mr. and Mrs. Cameron for their very kind hospitality.

Princess Meets The Brother Of Peter Townsend

ARUSHA, Tanganyika (AP)—Princess Margaret Tuesday met the brother of Group Capt. Peter Townsend, the divorced RAF hero who was once her suitor.

She smiled, nodded and shook hands as Francis Townsend, a tall, broad-shouldered district commissioner in the Masai country, stepped up on a dais to face her at a royal baraza (tribal gathering).

The princess' white-gloved fingers twisted restlessly as Townsend marched briskly off the platform to make way for the next presentation.

Francis Townsend, 35, has charge of an area of Tanganyika inhabited by the warlike Masai tribesmen. He lives quietly at Monduli with his Australian wife, Helen, and their three children. Thousands of Warusha and Masai warriors danced in salute to the princess, Margaret, wearing a cool-looking blue and white dress with a Swiss-embroidered pique skirt, toured the ranks of these assembled chiefs in a jeep.

Meanwhile, another member of the Royal family, the Duke of Edinburgh, was also in East Africa Tuesday. He arrived at Mopasa, Kenya, to board the royal yacht Britannia for the first leg of his round the world trip.

Ambassador To The Vatican Sought By CWL

LONDON, Ont. (CP)—The National Catholic Women's League, noting that there is no Canadian representative at the Vatican, requested Tuesday to petition the federal government to appoint an ambassador to the Vatican state. The league stated that such an appointment is part of Canada's responsibility as a leading country of the free world.

It also agreed to forward to the federal government a resolution proposing any move by the department of external affairs to ensure the Papal government as the official government of China, another petition to be forwarded to the federal government suggests that the age limit for children's allowances be increased to 18, and that the extension is necessary, the CWL said, because children are being detained longer in school and because the cost of living is so high.
