A SENSATION has been caused at Kings' on by the discovery of a case of body-snatching by the students of the Medical College. The stolen body was found laid out ready for the operation in the dissecting room of the College.

THE cargo of the steamer "Carroll," for Boston, yesterday, consisted of 897 bags and barrels of potatoes, 357 barrels of mackerel, 626 cases of eggs, 211 bags of starch, 32 barrels of hake sounds, 10 cases of cod oil, 601 cases of preserved lobsters, 2 casks of hides, 3 tubs of butter, etc.

BUSINESS throughout the United States is prosperous. The railways are doing a greatly increased business with corresponding profits. The coal and iron interests are in a good condition. The value of the cotton, wheat and corn crops are put down at \$1,000,000. For another year there will probably be no financial collapse.

THE United States Government has issued gold certificates to represent gold deposited at the Treasury, in sums of not less than \$20. Each note represents so much gold, which makes it the best of all currencies. The objection is its dearth, the cost being the same as gold currency.

GUS LAWLOR, of Hamilton, who is doing twelve months in the Central Prison, Toronto, was reported by one of the guards for insubordination. He was ordered to a dark cell for punishment, and on hearing what was in store for him he rushed to a bench in the broom factory, where he was employed, seized a knife and cut his hands in a horrible manner. Before secured he severed three fingers.

ALTHOUGH there have been large catches of codfish and herring of late, the demand is far in excess of the supply. Prime codfish is now selling freely at \$5.50 and \$6.00 per quintal, and the enquiry for herring is so great that prices rule about \$1 per barrel more than at this period last year. Shelburne fish are now realizing \$4.50 to \$5.50 and Bay herring \$4 to \$4.50.—St. John Globe.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Porte Unbends. The Natives for Arabi. Arabi to be Defended.

LONDON, Oct. 19. It is reported here that the Porte has notified Lord Dufferin that it is ready to enter into friendly negotiations for the settlement of the Egyptian question. The feeling against Said Pacha is dying out, and the excitement of the fanatical party is a thing of the past. Said Pacha is still accused of having lost Egypt to Turkey; but the moderate party hope that by successful diplomacy the question will be satisfactorily settled in the interests of Turkey. The Porte hopes, in his proposals to Lord Dufferin, that the statu quo will be maintained.

Much difficulty is felt in Egypt in collecting legitimate debts from the natives. Arabi, during the war, had given orders that no debt should be paid to any European by the natives. The natives still refuse to pay until Arabi has withdrawn the order.

News has reached here that the Egyptian Ministry has consented to allow Arabi to be defended by English Counsel at the conditional preliminary examination. It is not expected that this will be sufficient. The friends of Arabi are pressing for counsel at every examination, and the papers denounce the facilitating conduct and prejudice of the Egyptian ministry in the matter. The grounds for refusal are that the admittance of counsel would prove very inconvenient to the prosecution committee, and that they would rather hand over Arabi to the military authorities than allow the rebel to be defended by English Counsel.

[The following Pachas will be arraigned with Arabi Pacha for trial:—Toulba, Ali Fehmy, Mahmoud Fehmy, Abdel Samy, Toulba Yakoub, Omar Rahmy, and Ali Rouby, and Said Bey Gaudeel. The list of prisoners awaiting court martial has been handed to Sir Edward Malet, the British Consul General at Cairo. It contains 113 names, exclusive of prisoners in the provinces, who number thirty. Three colonels, accused of complicity in the late massacres, have been arrested in the interior and brought to Alexandria. So far the attention of the court appears to be mainly directed toward obtaining proof of the complicity of Arabi in the burning of Alexandria and other rebel excesses. No definite evidence on this point appears to have been yet adduced, notwithstanding the persistent efforts of the authorities. The prisoners stand their ground manfully, declaring that the war against England was begun by the order of the Khedive to resist the bombardment of Alexandria, and that it was afterward prosecuted by the will of the whole country as represented by the Council of Notables and by the leading members of all classes of the population of Cairo. The only rebel leader against whom damning evidence has been forthcoming is Suleiman Bey, the instigator of the firing and massacre after the bombardment. So far this man has eluded all search and is still at large. It is believed that he has effected his escape from the country.]

Arrival of the Heroes.

The Household Cavalry arrived home from Egypt last night. The troops presented a splendid appearance as they formed into position after landing, and were enthusiastically welcomed by the crowds gathered to witness their return.

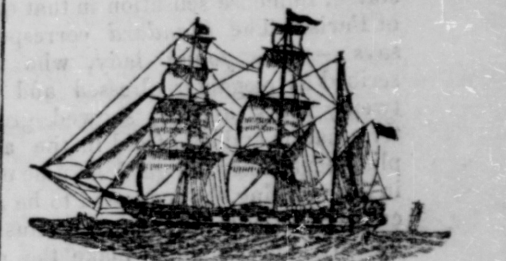

IN THE SUPREME COURT.

In the matter of An Act of the Parliament of Canada, passed in the forty-fifth year of Her present Majesty's Reign, Chapter 23, intitled, "An Act respecting Insolvent Banks, Insurance Companies, Loan Companies, Building Societies, and Trading Corporations, and of the President, Directors, and Company of the Bank of Prince Edward Island, an Insolvent Banking Company.

UPON the application of the Liquidators of the above-named Banking Company, and upon reading the affidavit of Lemuel Cambridge Owen, Charles Colson Gardiner, and David O. Chalmers, with the Schedule thereto annexed, filed the fifteenth day of September last, and the order made by me, dated the fifteenth day of September last, and the notice signed by the Prothonotary, issued in pursuance of such order, and the affidavit of Leith E. Brecken of the due publication of such notice filed the twenty-fifth day of September last, and upon hearing counsel for the said Liquidators and counsel for several of the contributors of said Company, I do order that a first call of forty dollars per share be made on all the contributors of the said Banking Company.

And I do further order that each such contributory do, on or before the first day of December next (A. And I do also order that the further hearing of the said order granted by me on the fifteenth day of September last, as to the further payment by said contributors of the further sum of forty dollars per share be adjourned until Monday, the eleventh day of December next, then to take place at my Chambers, in the Law Courts Building, in said Province, at the hour of eleven o'clock in the forenoon, and I do further order that a copy of this order, together with a notice from the Liquidators of the said Company, specifying the amount due from such contributory, in respect of such call, be served on all such contributory by posting the same in a letter, prepaid and registered in the General Post Office, in Charlottetown, in said Province, addressed to the party or parties contributory, at his, her or their last known address, or place of abode, or by the delivery thereof, severally, to the attorney of the party to be served.

And I do further order that a copy of this order be published in the Royal Gazette newspaper of said Province, and in the daily issues thereof, for two weeks from the date thereof.
