## Dodgers Deadlock Series; Shade Dark's Giants 8-7

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Speedy Maury Willis rambled home on Ron Fairly's shallow sacrifice fly in the last of the ninth and kept Los Angeles Dodgers alive Tuesday with an 8-7 victory that ended the best-of-three National League pennant playoff series with San Francisco Giants on one game apiece.

Willis, given an unexpected life when rookie pitcher Gaylord Perry passed up a force play at third and threw to first base on Daryl Spencer's sacrifice bunt, sped home ahead of Willie Mays' slightly off-target throw on Fairly's fly to centre.

It was a tense, dramatic game at 4 hours, 18 minutes the longest nine-inning contest in major league history—that ran the gamut from the sublime to the ridiculous. The Giants blew a 5-0 lead when Dodgers broke their string of 25 consecutive scoreless innings with seven big runs in the sixth.

TRIES EVERYTHING After his Giants fought back to tie the score at 7-7, manager Alvin Dark maneuvered desperately, using four pitchers in the ninth and eight in all, before the champion base stealer flashed home with the winning run.

All even at one game each, the two teams will play a third game this afternoon at the Municipal Coliseum. Walter O'Malley's multi-colored area with the pennant hanging in the balcony.

Willis, who had stolen his first base earlier in the game, worked Bob Bolin for a walk to open the ninth. Now with Willis on first, a threat to break for second at any moment, Dark reached: into his bullpen for relief hander Dick Lemay to hold Maury close to the base.

WALLS GILLIAM Lemay was so intent on keeping Willis close that he threw to first to rest him eight times in the meantime, he walked Junior Gilliam. Dark replaced Lemay with Perry, a 24-year-old right-hander, recently recalled from Tacoma.

With men on first and second and none out, Alton called on Spencer, an ex-Giant, to let a bunt. This he did but it went back to Perry who started to throw to third where Jim Davenport was waiting. Instead he whirled and threw to first, relieving Spencer by letting Willis, representing that precious winning run, reach third.

Once again Dark went to the bullpen. This time he called for a lefty, Mike McCormick. He later had planned to walk Tommy Davis, the league leading hitter, leading the bases. He wanted McCormick to pitch to Fairly, a left-handed batter.
