PUBLIC NOTICE

The Highway Traffic Act

The attention of motorists is drawn to the recently completed marking of all paved roads with either unbroken or dotted white lines.

At no time hereafter is it permissible for cars to cross such unbroken lines. Overtaking and passing other vehicles may only be done where the centre line of the road is dotted.

Cars must not park nor stop on any highway adjacent to an unbroken centre line.

Police Officers have been instructed to enforce strictly these provisions.

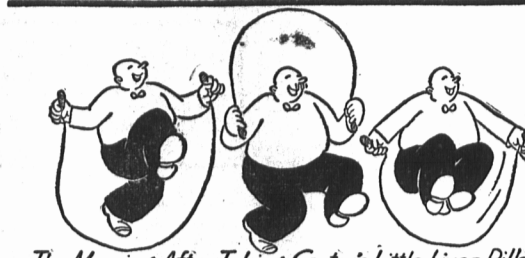

Mrs. Cyrus Jay, wife of Police Constable Cyrus Jay, is a patient in the Prince Edward Island Hospital suffering from severe burns about her arms, both received while starting a fire in the kitchen range at her home yesterday morning. The flames spread quickly about the kitchen before the arrival of the firemen and had worked to the outside of the house. An alarm was received at the Fire Hall about 6.30, the firemen quickly responding and on arrival at the residence on Gerald Street, the situation looked menacing. The motor dumper was in operation and with two lines of hose, the men attacked the flames on the interior and exterior of the building but at that time appeared to be returning to the Fire Hall. At the time the fire started, Constable Jay was at work outside while the other members of the family had not arisen. They were quickly aroused and vacated the house which at that time appeared impossible to save from being gutted. Mrs. Jay left the kitchen to go outside, it was learned; shortly afterwards she noticed smoke and returned to find clothing hanging from the ceiling. She caught up the flaming garments and tried to throw them outside but was forced to drop them in the porch. She was quite badly burned about the face and hands.

The forecast, however, is tentative only, explained the report, as conditions on the late crops in northern Alberta and Saskatchewan escaping the first hazard and barring further deterioration from recurring heat waves. In the face of many vicissitudes prospective yields indicate Manitoba and Alberta may harvest crops comparable to last year's good yields, while Saskatchewan's output should be above that of a year ago, the report according to the Free Press. Full-time workers employed on prairie farms will be given employment in harvesting the 1939 crop according to the survey. There is no shortage of labor, the survey shows, as there are many men in urban centres and transients to meet the supply.

Then the sobbing girl led officers to Jefferson's stalled automobile on a lonely beach trail and near it was found the nude body of Miss Dunn. The brunette beauty had been attacked and badly beaten. Melchen said Jefferson admitted he abducted the girls and killed Miss Dunn when she cried out against his assaults and "would not do what I told her to."
