CATTLE PURCHASED.—The Moncton Times says: Messrs. Haslam and Wright of Manitoba, who have been purchasing young cattle in this vicinity for shipment to the west, had a train load in the Moncton yard yesterday, and they will be forwarded to Manitoba today. The cattle are one and two years old and will go right through to Calgary, the freight being \$4 and \$5 a head.

PATENT REPORT.—The following Patent Statistics were prepared especially for this paper by Messrs. Marion & Marion, Solicitors of Patents & Experts, Temple building, Montreal:—

The last Report of the Commissioner of Patents furnishes an excellent comparative statement showing the number of patents issued by the United States and foreign Governments, from the earliest periods of this work to December 31st., 1897. In this, the total foreign product (from fifty-three countries) amounts to 1,122,724 patents, while the United States alone has 696,423 more than one-half of all the balance of the world's inventive product.

Of the foreign patents, France leads with 286,081; Great Britain has 252,990 to her credit, and Belgium with 139,742, and Germany with 113,254, comes next in order of patent importance. The smallest issues were in Siberia and the Bahamas, each having 2, and in St. Helena, 4.

It is stated that the number of applications for patents received during the year 1897 was the largest in the history of the office, and that there is a steady increase in this branch of the work.

Obituary.

We regret to have to chronicle the death of Mr. Andrew McDougall, of Rice Point, which took place on the sixth inst., after an illness of about four months, which he bore with Christian patience. Deceased was the fourth son of the late Archibald McDougall, elder, of Nine Mile Creek.

We may say that Mr. McDougall was one of the pioneer settlers of Rice Point, having resided on the farm on which he died for fifty years. Deceased married, forty eight years ago, Margaret, sixth daughter of the late Colin McEachern, of Belfast, at whose hands he received careful and tender nursing during his last illness. Of their family of four sons and one daughter two sons survive him, and four grandsons.

Mr. McDougall was a very diligent man, and punctual in business. We sympathize with the bereaved widow and other relations in their affliction.

Egypt is just contracting for the building of a monster dam across the Nile at Assuan, the site of the first contract. The river will be raised to a height of 66 feet above its present level and the lake which will be created will be 144 miles long. The height above the lower level will be nearly 350 feet, and the wall of masonry will be a mile long. The cost will be from \$9,000,000 to \$10,000,000, and the Egyptian Government will not only make no payment until the work is finished, but will derive profits from it which will enable it to pay the contractors and have something over. The work will add another 600,000 acres to the irrigated portion of Egypt, and will add about \$30 an acre a year to the 5,600,000 acres already under cultivation.
