Christianity is not a system of ethics, though it is supremely an ethical religion. The teaching of Jesus touches at every point man's ethical life.

Much stress is laid by St. Paul upon religious experience; the soul's relationship with God, the need for prayer and worship, and that personal integration which is the fruit of forgiveness.

In the epistle of the Nineteenth Sunday after Trinity St. Paul speaks of putting on "the new man, which after God is created in righteousness and true holiness."

When men deviate from the strict line of honesty and truth, whether from motives of policy or convenience, they are helping to undermine the basis of trust and genuine cooperation upon which alone, whether for the nation or the individual, or in the sphere of personal relationships, any good life can be achieved.

But the putting on of the new man symbolizes that which goes far beyond the realm of ethics. This "new man" is "a new creation." It is not simply a matter of reformation, of correcting faults here and there; it involves a radical change which penetrates the very depths of personality.

The ethical life becomes the fruit of which a man's relationship with God is the centre. The centre of his life is transferred from self to God. Such is the true basis of the Christian ethic.
