Potato Marketing

Because of the storm, produce shipments are practically at a standstill and demand for potatoes is slightly keener. Those in touch with outside markets believe there is no reason for any decline in potato prices. Some shippers are hopeful of the demand becoming slightly stronger during the next few weeks.

Hog Situation

The recent announcement by the Dominion Government of a floor price on hogs was welcomed by the majority of our mixed farmers. Although it is about three cents below the floor price requested by the Canadian Federation—which asked for twenty-eight cents at Winnipeg or twenty-nine and one-half cents at Montreal—it may have some helpful effects.

Strange But True

Among the Noatka Indians of British Columbia it was formerly a rule that any person who had dined of the flesh of a bear must abstain from eating any kind of fish for two months. Why? Because they fancied the fish would come by this knowledge and not allow themselves to be caught. The disappearance of herring from the sea about Helgoland in 1530 was attributed by the fisher folk to the misconduct of two boys who had abused a freshly-caught salmon and then threw it back into the water.

A similar disappearance of the smelts from some of our Island streams, in pioneer days, was set down by some people to the sin of fertilizing their farms with smelts during the spring run.

Scottish fishermen have the notion that if blood is drawn in a quarrel on the coast where herring are being caught, the shoal will leave and not come back in that season at least.

Before the Indians of Mexico poison the waters of a river to stupefy the fish they hope to catch they take care to make offerings of axes, blankets, beads, etc., to the master or leader of the fish. And they always treat the first fish caught with consideration in order to conciliate the rest of the fishing tribe, whose conduct may be supposed to be influenced by the reception given to those of their kind which were the first to be caught.

The Maoris always toss back into the sea the first fish taken, with a prayer that it may tempt other fish to come and be caught.

In the Middle Ages comets were regarded as "harbingers of woe," heralding plagues, the death of kings, civil wars and other misfortunes. A comet which appeared in 1456 was believed to have a connection with the taking of Constantinople by the Turks, and the comet of 1066 is asserted to have had a bearing on the success of William the Conqueror.
