Home Nursing Course Given In P.E.I. Hospital

Early Sunday morning 11 women started what was for them an unique experience, 44 hours of training in the P.E.I. Hospital under the supervision of Mrs. Peter McPhee, RN. This is a new project in Prince Edward Island, the first done here being carried out at the Charlottetown Hospital in November, and forms a part of the Emergency Measures Organization's civil defence program.

This training follows the successful completion of the Red Cross home nursing course, Mrs. R.S. MacDonald, RN, the instructor for the various details associated with the proper care of the sick in the home. Demonstrations and practical experience sessions form a major part of the home nursing course.

Lectures were given on emergency childbirth by Dr. Paul Cudmore, communicable diseases by Miss Alice Trainor, PIN, nutrition by Miss Doris Anderson, MSc, and artificial respiration by Mrs. Wilson MacDonald, RN. Mrs. F.L. Macmillan, director of home services, explained what the six-room supply cupboard contains and how and where supplies can be obtained.

FOR BEING PROS 16 Russian Gridders Barred From Game

MOSCOW (AP)—Sixteen football players on a collective farm have been barred from the game on grounds they were professionals getting high pay.

The players, who are supposed to be amateurs, were accused of receiving 200 rubles (\$20) a month in salaries and expenses for food and travel. The average industrial worker in the Soviet Union gets 20 rubles (\$2) a month.

The Communist party newspaper Pravda, reporting on the player disqualification Wednesday said the chairman of the collective farm had been reprimanded.

Pravda said that funds set aside for football expenses were canceled and would be used for farm expenses.

Apprenticeship And Trades Act Is Prepared

A provincial Apprenticeship and Trades Qualification Act has been drawn up for consideration at the next session of the Legislature.

Provincial apprenticeship training director W.S. McMurtry said yesterday the act is on its way now to Ottawa for review by the federal department of labor. "This review is necessary," he said, "to insure that no parts of the act will contravene part of previous federal-provincial agreements."

The act was drawn up by the province's apprenticeship advisory board with assistance from Mr. McMurtry.

"The act," he said, "if passed will bring us into line with the rest of Canada as far as trades qualifications and standards of apprenticeship are concerned."

CPBA Commissioner Resigns Wednesday

QUEBEC (CP) — Gene Letourneau, 63, announced Wednesday he is resigning as national commissioner and chairman of the rating committee of the Canadian Professional Boxing Association.

In a letter to Sam Kremen of Moncton, N.B., president of the association, he said "I have no alternative than to resign as your national commissioner and chairman of the rating committee."

His resignation is effective at the end of the month.

Letourneau said statements made at a meeting of the association in Moncton were false.

The association said after the meeting that Letourneau was interested in sanctioning bouts of fighters under suspension and with lifting the suspension put on Bob Cleroux, Canadian heavyweight champion, for failing to fight a scheduled bout with Toronto's George Chavalo.

Letourneau said he never lifted Bob Cleroux's suspension nor approved of him boxing in Quebec, for the good reason that he was suspended. "But I was against the idea of taking away his title. Those are the facts in the matter."

Letourneau has been boxing for more than 20 years.
