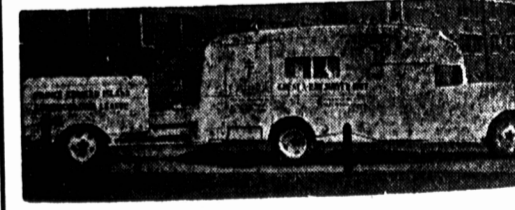
Rich Chinese families have a custom of preserving eggs up to one hundred years of age. Serving on special occasions, always in hope of a visit from Royalty.
