The three playgrounds with their supervisors are, Connaught Square, Mrs. Marion Gillan and Miss Janet Rogers; Victoria Park, Miss Olga Dowling; and Prince Street, Mrs. Mark Malone. The attendance figures for the various playgrounds were: Connaught Square 14,566; Victoria Park 4,755; and Prince Street 3,351. Commission members attribute the greater interest and attendance this year to the additional playground equipment made available for the season by the City Council. Informal closing exercises will be held at the three playgrounds this afternoon beginning at 2 p.m. at Prince Street followed at one hour intervals at Victoria Park and Connaught Square. During the meeting thanks were expressed to the Kinsmen Club for picnics held at the North Shore at which 250 girls and 275 boys from the city were present.

## Blast Damaging British Ship Is Blamed On Terrorist Mine

FAMAGUSTA, Cyprus (Reuters)—An explosion believed caused by a "sticky" mine Thursday night tore a hole in the side of the British ship Charles McLeod docked in the harbor here.

The Charles McLeod docked in Famagusta harbor Wednesday from Tobruk with army stores.

It is an LST (landing ship, tank) under British government charter.

Security officials believe a limpet mine was attached to the ship's hull while it was in port. It exploded soon after 8.30 p.m., blasting a gaping hole in the ship's side and causing a leak in the fuel tank. No casualties were reported.

Security forces sealed off the port after the explosion and set up a cordon around the ship.

Many scores of Greek and Turkish Cypriots are employed in Famagusta harbor.

The ship explosion was one of several incidents of fresh violence Thursday night that followed the end of the Cypriot underground's truce.

Wives of two British Army sergeants were shot and wounded while walking in Clemens Street, which runs through Nicosia's fashionable Ayios Dhometios area, where most British servicemen's families live. They were wounded in the arm. The husband of one, walking with them, was unhurt.

Minutes afterward, a Royal Air Force man and his wife were fired on half a mile away but were not hit.

The gunmen escaped.

Two British soldiers were wounded Thursday in terrorist raids on two village police stations, as Greek Cypriot terrorists stepped up their anti-British campaign.

Costas Kourides, a Greek Cypriot employed in a British Army canteen, was seriously wounded when gunmen shot him while he sat in a coffee shop at Tsadha village five miles north of Paphos.

LONDON (Reuters)—A star Russian woman athlete, who failed to keep her date with London magistrate Thursday on a charge of stealing five hats from a ladies' store, was suspected Thursday night of having fled the country on a Russian ship.

Nina Ponomareva, 27, a muscular discus thrower, was released on bail Wednesday night but failed to appear in court Thursday to answer to the charges. Police could not locate her.

The 3,258-ton Russian cargo ship Baladnov sailed from London docks for Leningrad early Thursday morning, and stewards said that a car carrying a woman and men looking like Russian officials arrived at the ship late Wednesday night.

The departure of the vessel, the dockworkers added, appeared to need no further investigation.
