DETROIT AP) — Terry Sawchuk, relaxed and confident about his hockey future, Monday came home to Detroit Red Wings. The trade that returned him from Boston Bruins was the signal for more Detroit deals. Left with two of the finest netminders in the National Hockey League, the Wings probably will complete a deal that will send Glenn Hall to Chicago Black Hawks. "I'm very happy to be back home and back in hockey," said the 27-year-old Sawchuk, who "retired" last December because of illness and nervous tension. General manager Jack Adams, who gave up 22-year-old left winger John Bucyk and an undisclosed amount of cash for the goalie he traded to the Red Wings ago, called it "a natural deal." "Terry is too good to stay out of the game," he said. "This is his home, this is where he got his start, this is where he belongs and we're very happy to have him back." Problem Of University Student Body Stressed

By BILL BOSS Canadian Press Staff Writer OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's university-student population is growing faster than predicted, a federal statistician told the National Conference of Canadian Universities today. But, E. P. Sheffield of the bureau of statistics added, the proportion of "college age" Canadians attending university is only one-third of the comparable United States figure. The text of his paper to a symposium of the NCCU, meeting here in conjunction with the current Conference of Learned Societies, was released to the press before delivery. Others of the 23 associations participating in the conference that meet today include the Canadian Association of Geographers, the Classical Association of Canada and the Canadian Association of Slavists. Dean E. D. MacPhee of the University of British Columbia said universities must expect to be asked to provide more residence accommodation during the next 10 years. TRANSITIONAL AID Gagnon, 22, a social-sciences student at Laval University, Quebec, said every student ought to spend his first two years in residence as a transition from submission to parental authority to "the conditioned liberty of the adult." Mr. Sheffield said the bureau of statistics predicted in 1955 that full-time university enrollment would increase at a rate that would see it doubled within 10 years. Enrolments had in fact increased at a rate 6.4 per cent greater than expected. United States enrolment for 1953-54 was 23.3 per cent of the college age population. In Great Britain the same year it was 3.1 per cent. In Canada it was 2.1 per cent. Dean MacPhee said university residences "can and should be self-supporting." ASK CMHA AID Planning of new residences should be going forward at all universities and Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation should be asked to consider underwriting such projects "at rates only slightly above those prevailing for government bonds." Mr. Gagnon, expressing the students' viewpoint, said residences should group students of assorted faculties, races and religious denominations "to make them more fire to help eliminate troublesome prejudices that might still exist." Boston Red Sox Blast A's; Tigers Drop Yanks

American League batters were hitting for the fences Monday as Boston defeated Kansas City 11-4 and Detroit Tigers blasted New York Yankees 9-4 in the only major league day action.

Milwaukee faced Brooklyn and Cincinnati moved into Pittsburgh in National League night games. Charlie Maxwell hit two prodigious wallops and Al Kaline and Harvey Kuenn added round-trippers as home runs accounted for all but one of the Tiger runs.

Frank Lary, with Al Aber's help over the last two innings, picked up his first victory since May 5 and the Tigers' third success in the four-game series that drew 129,372 spectators to Briggs Stadium.

MANTLE HITS 15th Tigers had 10 hits off three New York pitchers—starter Bob Turley and his successors, Don Larsen and Ralph Terry.

Mickey Mantle cracked his 15th home run for the first Yankee run in the sixth. Hank Bauer accounted for the other three, tripling and scoring on Tony Kubek's single in the eighth and hitting his seventh home run—with a man on—in the ninth. Dick Gernert of Boston hit two home runs and a double to drive in six runs and scored a seventh on Jackie Jensen's single.

SHELL TRIO The Red Sox first baseman, hitting .265 going in, got on base each of the five times he went to the plate. He was hit by a pitched ball in his fourth appearance and walked in his sixth.

Boston smacked 13 hits off three Kansas City pitchers. Billy Klaus also had a good day for the Sox, collecting two singles and a double in five appearances.

Willard Nixon went all the way for Sox and gave up 10 hits. Alex Kellner, now 2-4, was the loser, lifted in the fourth.

The As got two runs in the first on a walk, double and two singles. They scored again on Hank Smith's eighth homer in the fourth and on a pair of doubles in the eighth.

JERSEY CITY, N.J. (AP)—Righthander Bob Buhl permitted only four hits Monday night in a 2-1 Milwaukee victory over Brooklyn Dodgers that hoisted the Braves into a third-place tie with the Dodgers, who fell from second with their third loss in a row.

Gil Hodges had three of the Dodgers hits and scored their lone run in the fourth, when he led off with Brooklyn's first hit and moved around on an infield out and Gino Cimoli's single.

Buhl had early trouble with his control, but settled down after the fourth with a 2-1 lead on Ed Mathews' two-run homer in the top of the fourth against loser Don Newcombe.

Buhl walked six but retired eight in a row between Hodges' sixth-inning single and Gil's double with one out in the ninth. Newcombe was tagged for eight hits in his eight frames. An error by third baseman Charley Neal on Johnny Logan's bounce came ahead of Mathews' 400-foot-plac clout.

PITTSBURGH (AP)—The lowly Pittsburgh Pirates defeated the league-leading Cincinnati Redlegs for the first time in 16 games Monday night, copping a comeback-behind 5-2 victory as righthander Vernon Law pitched a neat four hitter.

The defeat left the Redlegs only one game ahead of the idle Phila-

delphia Phillies who moved into second-place. Brooklyn and Milwaukee are tied for third place, 1½ games behind.

Law was the last Pirate pitcher to beat the Redlegs before Monday night's contest as the Redlegs won 15 in a row. He pulled the feat July 22, 1956.

Law gave up a leadoff single to Johnny Temple and then Wally Post smashed his seventh homer of the season over the left field scoreboard. But, except for the fourth inning, when the Redlegs got their other two hits, Law was the complete master of the situation. He struck out three and didn't walk a man.

Might Starve If Farmer Retired At 65

TORONTO (CP) — A pension-plan consultant took issue Saturday with compulsory retirement at 65 and said if the nation's farmers embraced the idea, "we would all probably starve to death."

Moreover, contended William A. Mercer of Toronto, society would eventually rebel at the prospect of supporting financially the steadily-growing pool of idle people that would result from universal compulsory retirement at 65. Mr. Mercer's comments were contained in an article in Health Magazine, organ of the Health League of Canada. It followed closely the first Ontario conference of medical and industrial authorities on the problems of aging at which compulsory retirement at 65 came under heavy fire.

The president of William A. Mercer, Limited, wrote that if everybody quit his job at 65, "this group itself would soon form a voting bloc strong enough to force everybody quit his job at 65, 'this group itself would soon form a voting bloc strong enough to force government action on its behalf.'"

"If everybody were to retire at 65, we would look forward to one citizen living in idleness for every four in the labor force," and if they lived as well as those who still labor, "one-fifth of every employed person's income would have to be taxed away to take care of retired people alone." "Society is not prepared to stand the cost as a matter of interest, if all our over-65 farmers quit work today, we would all probably starve to death."
