### THE NATIONAL POLICY.

The National Policy has attained its twenty-one years have passed since the notable victory which resulted in its application to the industries and trade of Canada. It has all along been denounced by the Liberals; and yet the Liberals are maintaining it and striving to gain credit for "the growing time" which has resulted from its beneficent operation. It has been attended by prosperity almost from its inception. Even throughout the period of depression extending from 1893 to 1896—the worst the United States and Australia or even Great Britain ever experienced,—the industries and business and financial institutions of Canada were comparatively well maintained,—though there was necessarily a falling off of foreign trade resulting in loss of revenue and a few deficits. The Montreal Gazette points out that the population, which was put up by the Government experts in 1878 at 4,978,000, has, in the intervening years, increased by nearly 30 per cent., and is now, on the same authority, put at 5,248,000. While especially designed to promote domestic trade, through its effect in improving internal conditions, the National policy has been accompanied, also, by a large increase in foreign commerce. The exports, for instance, between 1878 and 1898, increased by over 100 per cent., or from \$79,322,000 to \$164,152,000. The imports in the same time grew by over 40 per cent., or from \$99,327,000 to \$140,323,000. The bank circulation, representing the amount of money needed to carry on the country's commerce, was \$20,475,000 in 1878, and is now \$40,270,000. The deposits, representing in a way the active and accumulated credit of the people, have grown by over 250 per cent., or from seventy million to two hundred and eighty millions. This growth has not been irregular. On the contrary, it has been remarkably steady. Slow at first, it is now so marked that all men even the greatest enemies of the National Policy which produced it—are compelled to admit that instead of the "blue ruin" which was predicted, we have "a growing time."

### FOOTBALL.

It is very pleasing to see the boys at practice on the park these fine autumn afternoons. The fact shows that the rising generation of football votaries are determined to maintain the reputation and honour won for our tight little Island by those who have gone before. In many a well fought field at home and abroad the activity and vigor and skill of our young men have been admirably displayed; and we confidently anticipate additional triumphs in the future. Football will have been given a great impetus in these Maritime Provinces by the enterprise of the Wanderers of Halifax who are about to expend a thousand dollars to secure the attendance of a crack team from Ireland. We do not expect that the Abegweit Crescent club of this city will have an opportunity to try conclusions with the redoubtable players from the Emerald Isle. But it is possible that they will be able to challenge or accept the challenge of those who will have that great advantage. To this end they ought to practice diligently and according to the strict rules of the manly game.

### NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The national debt of Canada was increased last year close upon \$2,000,000, although the surplus on consolidated fund account was upwards of \$5,030,000.

—The surplus of last year was \$5,000,000. Just think what it would have been if the Liberals in office had kept their promise to reduce expenditures.

—The Liberal government is running this country into debt when times are good and revenue abundant. How about the debt when times are bad and revenue small?

—Well done, Mr. Boyer! The winning of so many prizes in the hot competitions at St. John, shows that Mr. Boyer stands high among Canadian breeders of cattle and ought to open the eyes of P. E. Island farmers to the relatively high value of the stock bred in their midst.

—The Mail and Empire remarks that the \$70,000,000 supply bill is not a legitimate part of the National Policy. Under the National Policy the man with the hoe and the operative in the factory enjoyed his own earnings, but under the new Liberalism thirty millions of the annual profit of the State are taken from the people and given to partisans.

—Advices from Ottawa state that the account books for the last fiscal year have finally been closed. The total surplus is \$5,016,000, which is over \$400,000 in excess of Fielding's budget estimate. Capital expenditure shows an increase, however, of \$3,600,000, and the national debt has increased one and three-quarter millions. The revenue for the past two months has been about the same as last year.

—In 1896 the taxes were \$27,000,000 in 1899 they were \$35,000,000. When Mr. Foster saw the taxation accumulating he cut it down, as for example when he made raw sugar free. It is well remarked by the Mail and Empire that the Liberals at Ottawa should have reduced taxes and avoided extravagance and boodling. Had it done so the people would have had the \$8,000,000 that have been taken from them and wasted.

—The Montreal Gazette remarks that Siberia is now threatening the wheat producers with its competition. It is likely that the threat will be some time in being fulfilled, however. It needs people as well as soil capacity to raise wheat, and then it needs easy facilities for getting the stuff to market. It will be some years before Siberia will have either the people or the facilities to make it a great competitor, and other things may change in the meantime.

—Mr. Foster in a recent speech points out that Sir Richard Cartwright used to talk of the revenue as "taxation." Now the knight calls it "gross income." It will be observed that in the one case Sir Richard represents the revenue as something which the citizen pays out. This is when the Tories collect it and it is relatively light. In the other case the revenue is spoken of as something which comes in. It is something found. This is when Sir Richard is collecting it.

—Attention is directed by the Montreal Gazette to a suggestive passage in the evidence of the North Waterloo witnesses. One of the bribery brigade was arranging to pay for votes after delivery. The Witness declares:

"Lewis said that if he did not vote his ticket he would know by 7 o'clock that night. On election night Lewis told them to go to Bossard's the next morning and Bossard paid him (the witness) \$15 and paid Werne \$13."

The ballot is so worked in Ontario under the Liberal system that the machine can know how votes have been marked two hours after the close of the poll.

### ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Mail and Empire: President Kruger may be interested in knowing that the newest gun tested at Shoeburyness will kill at fifteen miles.

St John Sun: Mackenzie and Mann will be indemnified for their failure to get the Yukon contract. This firm of contractors is in a pretty safe position. If it gets contracts it gets rich out of them. If it fails it gets indemnified.

Mail and Empire: A Vancouver despatch states that there is no gambling at Dawson now. At any rate it is not likely there will ever again be attempted in that part of the country such a "gamble" as Sir Richard Cartwright was pleased to call the Yukon deal, in which the Young Napoleon played so bold a hand.
