Work in connection with conducting the first census in this city's history will begin within the next few days.

The census is being conducted under authority given the city by the Prince Edward Island Legislature in an Act to Amend the City's Incorporation Act in 1964, city comptroller John Butler said yesterday morning.

The census, he added, will provide the city with a directory of all inhabitants and will also provide some vital information required for civic administration.

Dr. J.S. Bonnell Addresses P.E.I. Nursing Graduates

Rev. J.S. Bonnell, DD, of New York City, delivered the main address at the graduation exercises of the P. E. I. Hospital School of Nursing and Radiology held in the Confederation Centre last night.

Dr. Bonnell told the nurses: "Keep ever in mind the gains that have been made in the last quarter of a century in the field of medicine and nursing. One of the greatest of these is the recognition of the patient as a person. Man is unity of body, mind and spirit. Your skill will minister not only to the sick organ but to a total human personality."

He reminded the graduates that besides good training their most important asset is a warm personality. They must be morale builders with a ready smile. And it is their duty to reassure apprehensive and worried patients.

Dr. Bonnell, who retired from the ministry four years ago, was brought up in Charlottetown and has a summer home in Georgetown.

Rev. Ewen MacDougall gave the invocation, followed by remarks from William Hayward, chairman of the proceedings and of the Hospital trustees, and Ella MacLeod, director of nursing. After the graduating class made the Florence Nightingale Pledge, the piano quartette of Helen MacRae, Jean Parker, Audrey Gillis and Suzanne Branton played the overture to "Carmen" by Bizet.

Diplomas and pins were presented by His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, W.J. MacDonald, Miss MacLeod and Vera Dewar, associate director of nursing education.

Following Dr. Bonnell's address the piano quartette played "Hungarian Rhapsody" by Liszt. Miss MacLeod, the Rev. Ross Howard and Mrs. George Vessey made the presentation of prizes to the graduates, after which Sharon Howatt delivered the valedictory.
