

Chaplaincy centre ready for fall term

Students returning to campus this term will find the new Chaplaincy Services ensconced in a new home; the Chaplaincy Centre is now established in the former Book Store. The \$25,000 renovation job, which includes furnishings, is being carried out by the Trades Section of the University's Physical Plant. The main area which has a permanent dias for church services is adaptable for meetings and other campus gatherings. Designed to meet the needs of the Chaplaincy the Centre also includes offices, a meditation room and a kitchenette. Four students, with the assistance of a Canada Works Grant of \$6500., are currently at

work to create religious art works for the new Centre. Tracy Bredo, a silversmith, is designing a tabernacle & crucifix; Carol MacKinnon, a worker in wood, will create the altar, and a cross for the Centre's exterior; peggy Trainor is weaving an altar cover, and a tapestry to hang as a backdrop to the altar; artist Dianne Cripps will create a mural in a religious theme. All are under the supervision of Ann Marie Wills, whose ceramics will include a vigil light, baptismal font, chalice & paten. These works are being executed at the School of Visual Arts, Holland College.

Career planning, help with course selection the reading lab, study habits development, personal problem assistance, scholarship and financial aid information, off campus housing, on campus housing, testing, overseas student organizations, information and providing I.D's are just some of the fields that Student Services can give you help in. In addition they provide a

Personal Awareness Program, assistance to mature students, Grade 11 entrants, and Centennial Scholars, and are an advisor plus providing services for the University Day Care Centre.

Student Services is a response to all the needs of students in the non-academic world. That does not exclude academics but it is the only department responsible for the personal development of the Student. It is an entity in itself in that needs can be met right there, and if they are unable to help they know where to find someone who will.

The offices of Student services can be found on the ground floor of Main building. In these offices you will find Jim Griffith, the director of Student Services. Jack Blanchard, director of student counselling, Marion Basha, Dean of Women, and Rev. Ron Evans and Father Brendan Magannety, Chaplains, will also be there to help you. they are usually to be found in their offices but they do also have a few off-campus functions. For sometime now they have been conducting High School visitations and thus establishing an on-campus contact for in-coming students.

The important thing for the student is to take advantage of these many and varied services.
