

**Truck Driver
Fined \$25
in City Court**

"To be travelling at 35 mph through the streets of the city with such a load, is terrible and unnecessary", remarked Magistrate A. J. Haslam in fining Gerald Cruys, Charlottetown, \$25 and costs or 10 days in jail on a charge of speeding at yesterday's session of the city police court.

The evidence of Cpl. Keith Wakelin revealed that on June 20 he had checked the accused travelling north on Park Street at 35 mph. Cruys, he said, was driving a huge 1960-model gray and black truck loaded with about 15 tons of gravel.

Finding guilty to taking a motor vehicle without the consent of the owner (joyriding), Paul John Steele, Charlottetown was remanded until June 20 at the request of Police Chief C.W. MacArthur.

Appearing for sentence on the charge of damaging property, a plate glass window at 45 Elm Avenue, the property of the Nemir Tweel Corporation Ltd., Kenneth Joseph O'Connor, Charlottetown, was fined \$50 and costs or 30 days in jail. Paul Joseph McGonnel, Charlottetown, \$30 and costs or 15 days, and Barry Palmer, Summerside, \$20 and costs or 10 days. All three were counselled by John P. Nicholson.

A further remand until July 1 was given Maynard Cadmore, Charlottetown, on the charge of the theft of money exceeding \$50 the property of McCain Foods Ltd. Counsel for the defence is Kenneth MacDonald, and the prosecution is being conducted by Alan K. Scates.

Pleading guilty to a charge of vagrancy, Edward Cullen, of no fixed address, was sentenced to 30 days in Queens County jail.

Failure to stop at a red traffic light resulted in another accused being fined \$10 and costs or five days.

Of five drunk and incapable, three were each fined \$20 and costs or 10 days, one \$10 and costs or five days and the fifth was sentenced to 20 days in jail.

**Jap Export
Steel Prices
Unchanged**

VANCOUVER (CP) — Plans of Japanese steel producers to reduce posted prices on five leading products in the domestic market will not affect exports to world markets, it was learned here Wednesday.

The reduction in Japanese domestic prices will be effective July 1, but export prices will not be affected.

In an earlier press release issued here, it was reported the price cut had been made in a bid to remain competitive in Canada despite Canadian tariff increases.

The price adjustments by the Japanese producers were decided upon sometime prior to the June 24 announcement by Prime Minister Diefenbaker of "stiffer" Canadian tariffs.

In Tokyo a spokesman for Nippon Steel Tube Company said the steel price reductions, ranging from \$2.00 to \$8.20 a ton, were prompted by the present tight money situation in Japan and will benefit Japanese industries only.

The reductions will apply to posted prices under an agreement made in 1959 by Japanese producers to stabilize prices in the industry.

The steel industry has also curtailed capital spending and his, with the price reductions, is agreed to back up the Japanese government's financial re-orientation policy seeking to improve the country's international balance of payments.

**Island Sheep

Approximately 25 registered sheep from five island farms were expected to arrive in Brandon last night for the All-Canada Sheep Show July 2 to 6. It was learned yesterday from Livestock Director L.W. Roper.

Lincoln Boswell and Allison Stewart, Dunstaffnage went along with the carload and will show the animals.

Veteran breeder and showman Almon Boswell, Dunstaffnage, who was nominated last year to Canada's Agricultural Hall of Fame, had expected at first to make the trip, but said yesterday he decided against it.

It is the first All-Canada sheep show which has been staged, and breeders here were waiting with interest to hear of the success P.E.I. sheep will have in the nation-wide competition.
