VALUABLE OYSTER BEDS.—The Summerside Journal says: The oyster beds planted a couple of years ago by Mr. R. Hunt, in that part of the harbor nearly south of his residence, are proving a grand success. On Monday last Mr. Hunt tested the beds and found them all doing well. The oysters on them are all of good size, and of excellent flavor, and give promise of being very plentiful in a short time. These beds will prove a valuable property, and the success of this experiment should lead others to make similar plantations.

EXCURSION TO PICTOU.—The excursion on the new steamer Northumberland yesterday, although a thoroughly enjoyable one in every respect, was not so largely attended as was anticipated. The steamer crossed to Pictou in the splendid time of three hours and eight minutes, which, though very fast, was not her maximum speed. Everyone on board was delighted with her. On the return trip, when about half way over, a steamer was seen in the distance ahead of the Northumberland and was soon overhauled. She proved to be the cruiser Acadia, and the race to this port was an exciting one—the Northumberland winning easily. The Northumberland's engines are of the best workmanship, and she keeps in perfect order by the efficient engineers in charge. Altogether, the steamer is a credit to the S. N. Co., and the excursionists were more than pleased with her and the manner in which they had passed the day on board. There is another excursion to-day.

THE DEAD CHIEFTAIN.

FUNERAL AT OTTAWA

AN IMMENSE PROCESSION.

Services at the Church.

LORD SALISBURY'S TRIBUTE

Memorial Service in Westminster Abbey.

OTTAWA, June 11.

Sir John Macdonald's funeral obsequies yesterday afternoon were the most imposing ever seen in Canada. The streets on the line of the procession were one solid mass of human beings, and several thousand persons were in the cortege, which took 35 minutes to pass a given point, walking eight abreast.

All the military, judicial, ecclesiastical, scientific and charitable societies participated.

The funeral procession left the parliament buildings at one o'clock. The pall-bearers were the fourteen Cabinet Ministers. The body was borne to the hearse by six Dominion policemen. Among those present were Lord Stanley and his staff, Maj.-Gen. Herbert, Gov. Angers of Quebec, Gov. Daly of Nova Scotia, the Speaker of the Senate in his robes of office, attended by the Sergeant at Arms bearing the mace, the Senators, the Speaker of the House of Commons in his robes of office, preceded by the mace-bearer, members of the House of Commons, judges in their official robes, civil service officials, members of the bar societies, representatives of the Grand Trunk and C. P. R., the mayors and aldermen of Montreal and Kingston, boards of trade, consular corps, political clubs, etc.

All the city bells tolled while the procession was en route.

At St. Alban's Church the service was fully choral and highly impressive. The Church was beautifully draped and the altar was decorated with exquisite flowers.

Soon after leaving the church, while on Rideau Street, a severe thunder storm came on, accompanied with torrents of rain.

The hearse was preceded by two large cars laden with the floral tributes.

The city is crowded with visitors. The Premier and Solicitor-General of New Brunswick were also at the funeral.

All stations on the C. P. R. from the Atlantic to the Pacific have been draped in black.

A London despatch says: "The death of Sir John Macdonald and the political results to Canada likely to arise from the sad event are still the general topic of conversation in political, colonial and city circles. Nothing more remarkable has ever been witnessed in London than the universal respect shown for the deceased statesman. From every corner of the empire come tributes of respect to his memory. This culminated in the decision to hold a memorial service in Westminster Abbey, which is considered to be one of the highest honors an Englishman can ever hope to attain.

A requisition was presented to the Dean of Westminster signed by all the leading ministers, and the leaders of both political parties in the Imperial Parliament, the Marquis of Lorne, Sir Charles Tupper, Sir Alexander Galt, Hon. Charles C. Colby and others. The memorialists pointed out that they desired to pay a last tribute of respect to one who has rendered so many services to the Dominion of Canada and the Empire in general and asked that their petition be granted.

The dean promptly assented and it was decided that the services should be held on Friday morning, when all the Imperial Cabinet Ministers and members of Parliament, who are able to attend, will be present, together with all the Canadians and other colonists at present in London.

It is expected that the service will be very grand and impressive, and that the dean himself will officiate.

Lord Salisbury paid a most graceful tribute to Sir John Macdonald in the House of Lords, which has much gratified Canadians at present in the city and cannot fail to be appreciated all over the Dominion. In the course of his remarks Lord Salisbury said that Sir John Macdonald was as great a constitutional statesman as any nation had ever seen.

Other members of the House of Lords followed in eulogies of the dead Canadian.

ANOTHER DESPATCH.

OTTAWA, June 11.

The funeral train with mourning trappings dripping with rain, pulled out of the station at 4 30 p. m., and at all the stations along the route crowds were in waiting to see the last of the Chief they all loved so well. At many stations the train made stops.

On arrival at Kingston the body was carried from the train by eight bearers (Dominion police) through two lines of "A" Battery to the City Hall, and there placed on a magnificent catafalque. A guard of honor of Royal Military Cadets was placed on duty.

The body will lie in state there until noon to-day and will be interred this afternoon at two o'clock.
