Mrs. Arthur Pitre is Acquitted

QUEBEC, March 18 - (CP) - Mrs. Arthur Pitre, who denied she tried to end her life because of her unwitting part in an aircraft disaster, was acquitted of a charge of attempted suicide.

The 41-year-old Quebec housewife who delivered a bomb that blew up a Canadian Pacific Airlines plane Sept. 9 and caused 23 deaths, had been awaiting decision in her case since early February.

Her acquittal came two days after J. Albert Guay was convicted of murder and sentenced to be hanged for the death of his wife, one of the plane passengers killed at nearby Sault au Cochon.

JACOBY ON Canasta

For Beginners - 1

Practically everybody in the country knows by now that Canasta is the popular new card game that has revolutionized American card-playing habits. Twelve million people are already playing it in America, and they've bought thirty million decks of special cards for the purpose.

One reason for the game's popularity is that it is easy to learn. More important: it's so exciting that you can't stop playing once you start. And in case you need any more reasons: it's a marvelous game for four people, but it's also a fine game for two or three or almost any number at all.

The first thing to learn is that you don't really need special cards. Just take two regular decks of cards (52 in each) and mix them together, making sure that you have four jokers with backs that match the cards. The cards may be of two completely different designs, but it's important to make sure that you can't tell a joker by looking at the back of the card.

You need four players, so get the Smiths in from across the street to be partners against you and your better half. Shuffle your 108 cards thoroughly and, after a cut, deal them one at a time until everybody has seven cards. Then turn the next card up and put it at the side of the undealt cards in the middle of the table.

Does this remind you of gin rummy? Well, it should. Canasta is a kind of rummy game, and rummy players will become good Canasta players in no time at all. Save these simple instructions. If you're a beginner, you will soon be able to profit from the tips given in the second part of each article. If you're an experienced player, save the first half to teach the game to others.

For Experienced Players - 1... As every Canasta player knows, you get credit only for the melds that you put down on the table. When the hand comes to an end, you're stuck for all the cards in your hand—whether they are meldable or unmeldable.

For example, if you are stuck with three aces in your hand, you lose 60 points. If you had put them down on the table, you would gain 60 points for them. The difference between losing and winning 60 points is 120 points.

Naturally, the first thing beginners should do is meld every card they can. This method of playing is bound to lose if the opponents are on their toes.

Suppose you have a few melds on the table—say in kings, queens, and jacks. You've melded whatever you could, and you have only four or five cards. Now one of the opponents freezes the deck and keeps throwing picture cards. You can't take those discards because you have melded all your picture cards. The result is that you can never get the discard pile.

That is murder. The side that keeps getting the discard pile is absolutely bound to win.

Goal Production Up For February

OTTAWA, March 18 - (CP) - Canadian coal miners produced 1,773,000 tons in February, five per cent more than the 1,688,000 tons which came out of the mines in the same month a year ago, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today.

The cumulative all-Canadian coal production total for the first two months of this year was 3,522,400 tons compared with 3,444,600 tons in the same period last year.

February coal production by Provinces with February, 1949 totals in brackets were: Alberta 770,000 tons (781,000); Nova Scotia 543,000 (498,200); Saskatchewan 251,000 (213,600); British Columbia 162,500 (161,100) and New Brunswick 46,500 (38,000).

Imports of coal decreased sharply in February to 361,500 tons from the 827,700 tons imported in February, 1949 and in the first two months of the year to 995,800 tons compared with 1,688,600.
