## Obituary.

Last week we chronicled the death of Captain Patrick McMahon, which sad event took place at his residence, Elliot Grove, Rocky Point, on Dec. 11th. The deceased was well and favorably known in all parts of the Island, having been for many years in the employ of the leading firms of the Province. His health was always remarkably good until last winter, when he began to suffer from a species of stomach trouble, which was pronounced by his physician to be catarrh of the stomach. He suffered very much towards the end, and often spoke of death as being a happy release from pain. Always a loving husband and kind father, his loss will be most deeply felt in his beloved home circle, while his many friends will mourn the loss of a generous and obliging neighbor. To his afflicted widow we tender our heart-felt sympathies, trusting that for consolation she will turn to Him to whom her loved and lost looked in his last moments.

A correspondent writes: "The sudden death of Mr. John Pratt, which occurred on Monday, the 3rd inst., has cast a gloom over the village of Pownal. Mr. Pratt arose in his usual health, and about nine o'clock, in company with Mr. Joseph Jardine, proceeded to a sale of wood in Lot 48, a distance of about 5 miles. When within a short distance of their destination Mr. Pratt tied his horse, and he and Mr. Jardine were joined by Mr. James Yates. They had walked but a short distance when Mr. Pratt complained of a pain in his breast, and exclaimed, 'I am gone!' His friends kindly supported him, but in a few moments he was dead. His loss will be long felt. He was a good neighbor and a kind friend, and always ready to help those in need. He leaves a wife, two sons and two daughters to mourn the loss of a loving husband and kind father. His remains were followed to their last resting-place in the Roman Catholic Cemetery, Vernon River, by a large number of his relatives and friends, who, with sad hearts, paid this last tribute to his memory.

At Freeland, Lot II, on Tuesday, the 11th inst., after a short illness, which she bore with patience and Christian resignation to the Divine Will, Jane, the beloved wife of J. T. Milligan, in the 27th year of her age. A short time previous to her decease she had given birth to two children; and in connection therewith is the remarkable circumstance, namely, on the day the twins were born was the deceased's birthday, and the day of her death was seven years of age. The deceased led a most exemplary and christian life, and was much beloved and respected by all her neighbors and acquaintances. She was a kind and loving wife and mother. Her kind exhortations through her illness, to those who were around her were edifying and beautiful. She calmly passed away trusting in the love of her dear Saviour, leaving a sorrowing husband and six small children to mourn their irreparable loss.

## England's Naval Needs.

In the debate on the naval estimates, Lord Charles Beresford urged the necessity of strengthening the navy and deprecated the notion that in the event of war England could place her commerce under the protection of a neutral flag or could depend upon allies. Lord George Hamilton, first Lord of the Admiralty, in replying, admitted the justice of many of the remarks of Lord Charles Beresford, but objected to his comparison of the English with the French navy. France, he said, certainly had plenty of vessels, but she was engaged in building so many at a time that it took years to complete them, and when completed they were comparatively obsolete and had to be altered. He contended that the Admiralty was doing all that it was possible to do with the resources obtained.

Secret societies, with extensive ramifications, composed of young Armenians, and modelled after the Young Italy societies, which flourished prior to 1848, have been discovered in Russian Armenia. Their object is to rebel against Russian rule, and to establish an Armenian union and independence.

## Local and Other Items.

THE STANLEY.—The steamer Stanley arrived from Pictou about half-past ten this morning, and sails on return this afternoon.

CONCERT.—The Sunday School of the Methodist Prince Street Church intend giving one of their old fashioned entertainments on the night after Christmas in their spacious school-room. Choruses, Solos, Readings, Kindergarten Songs, Christmas Carols, &c., and we are sure this notice will be quite enough to secure the accustomed audience.

THE MOTHER-IN-LAW QUESTION.—A case came before the Sheriff's Court at Dundee, Scotland, recently, in which a woman claimed alimony from her three sons-in-law. The sheriff decided that "the liability of a son-in-law, in Scotland at least, is thus a firmly established institution with a legal status now added to her former great moral weight in the household."

AN AMERICAN OPINION.—The New York Tribune speaking of Cleveland's last message, says: "The President contents himself with referring to his special messages on the Fishery Treaty and Retaliation as embodying his views respecting questions at issue between the United States and Canada. As those two messages presented two antagonistic policies, each of which excluded the other, it was manifestly impracticable for him to reconcile them. He accordingly leaves each tub to stand on its own bottom."

MODEL MILLS.—The grist mill at the head of Souris River, owned by Lazar White, Esq., is one of the best equipped on the Island. The building is 50x28, and 18 feet post. All the latest improvements, burr stones, eureka smutters, etc., have been introduced, and this mill is capable of turning out flour of excellent quality. The kiln in construction is large and commodious. Mr. White makes a specialty of Graham flour and oatmeal. Besides this there is a first class saw mill on the premises, run with Smallwood's improved rotary. Mr. Charles VanDerstine is the millwright who built both grist and saw mills, and deserves credit for the way he has done his work. We wish Mr. Wright every success in his enterprise.

IT OUGHT NOT SO TO BE.—There is living in a village in Hants County, Nova Scotia, a venerable minister of the gospel who is a Doctor of Divinity, the master of four or five languages, a true born, ardent proselyter, a devoted and laborious Christian. We have it on excellent authority that this venerable Father is in very straitened circumstances, pecuniarily. He has never told us so; probably he has never told any one. But it is true, nevertheless; and it ought not to be true. A man who has toiled as he has done should be above want in his closing days. We have not given the name of the gentleman to whom we refer. Many will at once understand our reference. If any wish to take a practical interest in the case, they can do so through this office. To prevent misapprehension we add that the minister was not a Presbyterian. —Presbyterian Witness.

## Personal.

Madame Boulanger has withdrawn her suit for a divorce from her husband.  
Victoria (B. C.) papers announce the death of Dr. Dearden, formerly a partner in that town of Dr. McSwain.  
Mr. Moroney, imprisoned in Kilmainham jail for contempt of court under the Coercion Act, has been released by order of the court on the ground of ill-health.

A City of Mexico despatch says a rumor is current at that place that Sir Spencer St. John, English minister, will probably replace Lord Sackville at Washington.  
Lady Salisbury has initiated a movement for presenting Mrs. Phelps with a souvenir of her stay in London, where her hospitality and kindness of heart will always be respectfully remembered.  
The London Star says Gen. Charles Warren, lately chief of the metropolitan police, is going to Suakim to settle affairs there after the fighting between the British forces and the Arabs is ended.

## Mgr. Persico's Report.

Mgr. Persico's report on the Irish question is almost completed. He directs attention to the anomalous fact that all the Government authorities in Ireland, from the Lord Lieutenant downward, are Protestants, and not well-disposed towards Catholics. On the other hand, he says, the agrarian struggle engenders outrage and a total violation of the moral law. He himself has improved the state of affairs, but much remains undone. The Irish people refuse absolutely to admit that the plan of campaign is criminal. They consider it a legitimate retaliation upon the landowners who, they say, must pay for the misdeeds of their class in the past. The land courts sometimes succeed in quieting the people by obtaining concessions from the landlords, but generally they inspire little confidence. The Pope may still do much, provided he can convince the Irish people that he is not acting in accordance with an agreement with the English Government. The people must be made to comprehend the moral importance of their acts; they must be taught to accuse themselves to a separation of political questions from moral questions. They must not serve as the instrument of those who, under the pretext of nationality, lead them to the commission of acts that are contrary to morality. Mgr. Persico expresses the most absolute disapproval of boycotting. He signifies the opinion that Irish political aspirations must be satisfied before peace can be restored.
