Legal Talks Rejected By Athens

By DAVID LANCASHIRE ANKARA, Turkey (AP)—Relations between Greece and Turkey reached a new danger point Thursday in their dispute over Cyprus. Greece rejected Turkey's appeal for direct talks on the crisis and Ankara threatened a mass expulsion of Greeks living in Turkey.

In Cyprus, the United Nations commander said the halt in the communal fighting is "only a breather." The spokesman said that Turkey might resume the air raids, even more raising the threat of war between Greece and Turkey. Greece warned Thursday it would give full support to the Greek-Cypriot government in case of new Turkish attacks on Cyprus.

A Turkish foreign ministry spokesman warned that 12,000 Greeks living in Istanbul will be deported unless Greece drops its all-out support of Archbishop Makarios, the Greek-Cypriot president, and some solution is reached through negotiations. "Everything depends on the attitude of the Greek government," he said.

His statement was made before Athens' rejection of direct negotiations was announced. The spokesman said that he told reporters there is some hope of direct talks between Greece and Turkey, as requested by Inonu Monday in a message to Greece's Premier. He has hinted at a five-week deadline.

He said if the stalemate continues beyond the deadline, he would call for a UN Security Council meeting after Sept. 15. Turkey has abstained, effective on that date, in a UN agreement under which Greeks have been authorized to live in Turkey. They are influential in professional and business affairs.

About 1,000 Greeks have been deported because of the bad atmosphere over Cyprus, Soyuz said. "It will go on... it is not a bluff."

Bitter Demonstrations Flare At Berlin Wall

BERLIN (AP)—Angry West Berliners Thursday night attacked a Soviet army car and smashed a heavy truck trailer half-way through Western police barriers protecting the Berlin wall.

They tried to push through the breach up to the wall itself but were repulsed by Western police in a club-wielding, rock-and-potato throwing battle.

One leather-jacketed demonstrator was left bleeding and unconscious on the ground.

Just 500 feet away from the wall, a furious group attacked and heavily damaged a Soviet army car trying to make its way back to East Berlin.

The bitter demonstrators flared as West Berlin marked the third anniversary of construction of the Communist wall which splits the city in two.

Demonstrators chanted "the wall must go" as they battled police in a series of scuffling to prevent violence.

Then a number of them grabbed a heavy truck trailer from a lot and sent it speeding down the street toward police barriers. Policemen jumped aside and the trailer smashed through the middle barriers, especially erected to prevent anniversary attacks on the wall.

When the demonstrators attempted to run through the breach, police moved in swinging clubs.

Earlier, about 300 youths attacked police lines in the Anhalter Bahnhof area around a park after the UN Security Council retained a cease-fire in the northwest Chinese city.

The youths were not seen to begin setting up a buffer zone at the main danger point, Kolkovskaya, where the UN Security Council has ordered 500 Turkish-Cypriots who were pressed from three sides in last week's fighting.

China Begins Large Scale Army Games

TOKYO (AP)—Large-scale military manoeuvres were announced Thursday by Communist China's Premier Zhou Enlai to stand beside Communist North Viet Nam in repulsing an aggressor.

Radio Peking said the manoeuvres are being conducted in Kwangtung and Fukien, adjoining provinces bordering the Chinese coast from the Gulf of Tonkin through Formosa Strait.

Chinese officers and soldiers were reported to be supervising the exercises of militiamen. It was not disclosed whether planes or heavy armaments were involved.

BNA Act Slated For Discussion Here In Sept.

OTTAWA (CP)—Methods of amending the British North America Act in Canada will be discussed in September at a provincial premiers conference in Charlottetown, P.E.I.

Pearson Asks Party Heads To Seek Flag Compromise

By KEN KELLY OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister Pearson has invited party leaders to another summit conference on the flag, apparently in hopes of reaching a compromise solution to the explosive issue.

Informants said Thursday the leaders are scheduled to meet next Tuesday for three maple leaf second time all the leaders have met in connection with the flag issue since the last time in the Commons.

The first meeting, aimed at reaching a time limit on the length of debate, ended without agreement because the Progressive Conservatives would not accept such a limitation.

Informants said the new talks are related to proposals that the distinctive Canadian flag be a single red maple leaf on a white background with vertical blue bars at the edges.

The government's proposed design is for three maple leaves on a white background with blue bars at the edges.

COMPROMISE SEEN

A group of Conservatives, estimated at between 25 and 50, have decided their intention is to keep the flag debate going indefinitely unless the government drops its three-leaf design. Most of them want the Red Ensign as the Canadian flag.
