The Refugi Courteous.

CHARACTERISTIC REPLY OF BISMARK TO A CHARGE THAT HE WAS AIDING CATHOLICS AGAINST CATHOLICS.

The debate in the Usterhaus on the ecclesiastical bill on the 23rd inst., brought out some of Prince Bismarck's strongest peculiarities. In defending the measure he had to attack the speeches of some members who are his own supporters like the National-Liberals Eyer and Pfaff, the ultra-Conservative Baron Hammerstein and other zealous defenders of the Protestant church, who are convinced that the Chancellor has gone too far in his concessions to the Vatican and has virtually taken that journey to Canossa which he once declared he would never make. Among the most interesting episodes was Baron Hammerstein's accusation that the Government was imperiling the Protestant church. In concluding his speech he said: "If the popes of Cardinal Manning that the fight between the Catholic and Protestant churches will be fought out on the sunny plains of Brandenburg is destined to be fulfilled, and if therefore, the Protestant church is to succumb in the fight, then the men who deemed an alliance with the Pope as necessary must be held responsible." The charge thus levelled directly at the Chancellor produced a profound sensation. Prince Bismarck started up to respond. He was much agitated, and in a voice quivering with excitement denied that the ascendancy of the Protestant church was endangered. He ridiculed the idea that the restoration of the former rights of Catholics would damage the Protestant establishment, and advised the National Liberals and Conservatives to join him in trying to attain the final secession of the Kultur-kampf. The speech was effective in the sense that it showed that Prince Bismarck was determined to carry the bill in the exact form in which it was presented to the Unterhaus, and would tolerate no opposition from his own supporters. The bill must pass, but this week's discussion has left angry feelings and much discontent in the National Liberal and Conservative groups.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

King's County Election Case.

THE FIRST DIVISION.

Government Majority, 32.

OTTAWA, April 28.

After routine, Mr. Skinner made his motion asking that the election returns for Queen's, N. B., be so amended as to award the seat to the King. He recited the circumstances of the case, and cited several English cases in support of his contention that the duty of the returning officer was to return the candidate receiving the largest number of votes. He quoted one English case where the returning officer returned a candidate having a minority of votes, and Parliament ordered the return to be amended, erasing the name of the candidate returned and substituting the other man.

Hon. Mr. Thompson commended the fair tone and ability in which Mr. Skinner presented his case. He could not, however, agree with him as to the course which ought to be taken. The precedents quoted in which the British Parliament revised the returns of elections officials were too old to be useful. Seeing that these precedents were established before the British Parliament had given over to the courts the hearing and decision of controverted election cases, the only thing left to Parliament since the passage of the Controverted Elections Act was to decide on the personal qualifications of candidates. He submitted an amendment that the case be referred to the committee on privileges and consideration. The debate was carried on in an excited manner until one o'clock, when the vote stood—For the amendment, 109; against, 77.

Sir Donald Smith, Bergeron, Desjardins, Gaudet and Coulton voted yes; Paterson of Essex, Coups, L. Duchesny, Amyot, Dupont, Gigault, Doryon and Cimion voted no. The result of the first party vote was greeted with loud cheers on the Government side.

LONDON, April 28.

A motion that the House go into committee on the Crimes Bill was carried last night by 441 to 240.

CORK, April 28.

Hon. Capt. Thomas Plunkitt, magistrate at Cork, has been instructed by the Government to keep a close watch over all circumstances attending the departure of Wm. O'Brien on his way to Canada to inaugurate a campaign against Governor General Lansdowne on account of his alleged unfair treatment of his Irish tenants.

THE LATE GALE

DISASTERS AT SEA.

HALIFAX, April 28.

Seven fishing vessels arrived to-day demoralized from the results of the gale of the 26th inst., which they report has been very disastrous on the banks. A number of Yarmouth lobster men were driven to sea by the gale and believed to have been drowned. The sealing schooner M. A. Belle, from Magdalen Islands, was so badly pounded by the ice off Cape Breton coast that the crew abandoned her to save their lives. A large mass of ice was driven in shore between Canso and Halifax to-day.

Drowned While Fishing

GLOUCESTER, Mass., April 28.

The schooner Abbie F. Morris, from Grand Banks reports (March 17) Charles Morrison belonging to P. E. I. and Edward Burt, a Swede, two of the crew, were drowned by the capsizing of a dory while attending trawls.

Disastrous Gal.

LONDON, April 28.

A despatch from Perth, the capital of Western Australia, says a hurricane swept the northeast coast on the 22nd inst. The pearl-fishing fleet, numbering four boats was destroyed and 55 persons perished.

Fatal Collision at Sea.

LONDON, April 28.

A despatch from Cooktown, Australia, announces that the steamer Berton was sunk, in collision with a bark, off the Island of Formosa; 15 persons were drowned. No Europeans were lost.

Lost at Sea.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 28.

Seventeen persons were recently lost at sea with the schooner Flying Send, hailing from Kodiak, Alaska.
