"Crown Jewels" On Display Here

Queen Elizabeth II's visit to Canada is an eagerly awaited event, and it is interesting to note that exact replicas of the "Three Stars of Africa" which are a part of the Royal Crown Jewels - are on display, right here in Charlottetown. As a feature of Taylor's Jewellers Ltd. the world's largest diamond - the "Cullinan I" in the King's State Crown; "Cullinan II" (in the English Sceptre) and "Cullinan III" (in the final of the Queen's State Crown) have been faithfully reproduced down to the last detail. At the same time, a step-by-step demonstration of the little-known art of the Diamond Cutter is similarly displayed in the window. From the diamond-in-the-rough - to the finished jewel, nine replicas show the various stages in the transformation of a dull shapeless mass into a beautiful 58 faceted diamond with all its brilliance, clarity and "fire". From this display, the public can view this fascinating process and be reminded of the nervous anxiety of Mr. J. Asscher, assigned to cut the Cullinan. The crystal was studied intently for many months before it was decided to cleave it into five parts. The first blow was struck by tapping the large cleavage knife with a steel rod. The crystal remained intact, but the knife was broken. Now, more tense than before, Mr. Asscher prepared to make the second attempt. This time the crystal split as planned, but it is reported that Mr. Asscher fell into a dead faint. The "Cullinan" and the diamond-cutting display will be on view for a week at Taylor's Jewellers and the public is cordially invited to avail themselves of the opportunity of seeing this unique display.

Take Frills Off Coat Of Arms

OTTAWA (CP)—The frills have been erased from the Canadian coat of arms. A reproduction of the simplified version of the coat of arms now is in place at the main entrance of Parliament's Centre Block at the foot of the Peace Tower. The reproduction is part of Parliament Hill's decorations for the four-day visit of Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip which begins Saturday. The government has authorized use of the new design for all government purposes, such as reproductions on stationery, medals, insignia and buildings, the state department said Monday. A simplified design of the shield surmounted by the crown, used as an alternative to reproduction of the entire coat of arms, also was authorized. Reproductions of the new design, prepared by Alan Beddoe, heraldic adviser of the Royal Canadian Navy, will be turned out by the Queen's printer as soon as possible. Generally, removing unnecessary frills—which were not heraldic elements—from the coat of arms has given it a neater, clearer appearance. It retains all the heraldic elements assigned by a 1921 proclamation, which describes the coat of arms in heraldic terms. For instance, the harp represented in the shield was previously given the form of a woman. Now it's just a harp. One major change is use of the

Sees "Moons" As Wartime Weapon

MONTREAL (CP)—The man who developed Canada's first naval air squadron in 1945 said Thursday satellites could create a type of warfare involving "moons" with warheads which could be directed at any part of the earth. Former Lt.-Cmdr. David Wilkinson, RN, felt that possession of such satellites by potential enemies could threaten world peace. He has been in Canada for a few weeks on business and visiting with form members of the original squadron. The original craft of the unit was the Mark 15 Seafire. The squadron was comprised of 400 Canadians, many former members of the RCAF. The unit, now with changed names, is equipped with jets.

TO PREACH HERE

Evangelist E.P. Benoit, who is starting a two-week preaching series in the Central Christian Church in Charlottetown on October 20th. It will be the fourth time that he has been at the City church in this capacity. Mr. Benoit spent several years in the field as a full-time evangelist and college representative. He is now pastor of the Tuxedo Park Church of Christ in Calgary. He is also a professor in the Alberta Bible College, an institution for the training of Christian Church Ministers in Canada. He has had outstanding success as an evangelist both in Canada and the United States.

Economist Says Don't Ask Government

MONTBELLLO, Que. (CP)—Stuart Armour, economic adviser to the Steel Company of Canada Limited, Hamilton, Tuesday called on Canadians to ease pressure for government services. Mr. Armour, addressing the Canadian Institute of Plumbing and Heating at the Seignior Club, said easing the pressure would allow Canadians to ask the government to reduce taxes. "It is of no use to cry out against our tax burden while at the same time we continue to ask government for more and more." Mr. Armour suggested the government could easily reduce defence expenditures. "It seems strange for a sparsely-populated country in the throes of a great development to maintain in uniform something like 100,000 of its most useful citizens and to employ another 40,000 to 50,000 civilians to take care of the bookkeeping problems involved." A reduction in defence expenditures could reduce taxes and give industry new incentive to enterprise. "Above all, a reduction in government spending by halting inflation would make it possible to halt the imbecilic wage-price leap-frogging which has almost continually characterized the period since the end of the Second World War." Text of his speech was released to the press in advance of delivery.
