**Local and Other Items.**

**THE IRISH PARTY.**—Mr. Thomas Sexton having declined to undertake the leadership of the Irish party in the House of Commons, it is possible that Mr. Dillon's successor will be Sir Thomas Henry Esmond, anti-Paranellite, member for West Kerry and senior whip of the party.

**MAY LEASE HIS SEAT.** Proceedings have been set on foot in Toronto to unseat Alderman Spence, who is well known in Charlottetown. It is claimed that Mr. Spence is not possessed of the necessary qualification—that he is not rated either in his own or his wife's name with \$1,000 freehold or \$2,000 leasehold property, which is the amount required by the statute.

**A TERRIBLE EXPERIENCE.**—A Canadian woman, the wife of Rev. Mr. Kynhart, a Belgian missionary, has had a terrible experience among the tribes of Tibet. The missionary's wife has reached Tachieula after having been hunted for two months through the mountains, at one time being pelted with boulders from the cliffs overhead. Her husband was murdered and her son died from exhaustion.

**INTERESTING EVENT.**—A remarkable ceremony took place at the Island of Orleans, Que., on Sunday last week. A resident named Pierre P. L. celebrated his golden wedding at the parish church, and at the same time he celebrated his silver wedding, and the ceremony of the latter was married in a separate ceremony, attracting a very large audience at the church.

**LOOKING UP HOME.**—The Ottawa Free Press says: Herr Zoltan Van Rajcs, who has been sent out by a community in Hungary to investigate the agricultural advantages of Canada, is at the Brunswick. Herr Rajcs has travelled extensively through Manitoba and the territories, and has visited the Hungarian colonies at Esterhaza and Kaposvar. He says that the climate of this country will be entirely suited to the taste of his people, since they are a hardy, vigorous race. He will visit the Upper Ottawa along the route of the proposed Georgian Bay canal and write his impressions on that district. Herr Rajcs will be in the city a few days.

**A STRANGE CASE.**—According to a New Haven Conn., despatch Miss Lena Gardner, of Cromwell, is suffering from a peculiar physical affliction. Miss Gardner's wisdom teeth are growing in her jaws horizontally instead of vertically. The teeth cause terrible pain, but the physicians have been unable to give Miss Gardner any relief. She has been at Hartford hospital for treatment, and the surgeons there say that her case is the first of its kind on record. They are unwilling to extract the teeth for fear of breaking her jaw. The pain has caused her mouth to become set, as in a case of lockjaw, and the physicians are afraid this trouble will result.

**THE NEW LEADER.**—The new leader of the Liberal party in England, Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, is not a very young man, being over 60 years of age. He was born September 7, 1836. He is an old Parliamentarian, having represented the Stirling District in Scotland, since 1868. He is the son of the late Sir James Campbell, and assumed the name of Bannerman under the conditions of the will of his uncle. He was educated at Glasgow University, finishing off at Cambridge. He has held the offices of Financial Secretary to the War Office, and afterwards Secretary for the Admiralty. In 1884 he was Secretary for Ireland, and in 1896 and 1892-5 Secretary of State for War. The Irishmen nick-named him the "Scotch Sandbag."

**INFLUENZA IN ITALY.**—Not less instructive than interesting are the statistics just issued on the deaths which have occurred in the Italian kingdom during the first six months of 1898 as compared with the corresponding period of 1897. The population of Italy is nearly 31,000,000, and the number of deaths from every cause during the first six months of 1898 was 388,096, as against 344,890 in the first six months of the previous year. This increase in the first named semestral period is due especially to the epidemic, protean in form though called by one name—"influenza." The testimony of Italian physicians is unanimous as to the circumstance that while this disease caused directly only 3,159 deaths in the first semester of 1898, it was immediately responsible for more than double that number, 8,370, in the corresponding period of 1898. Not only so, but the same professional authority testifies that it all probability it contributed to augment the number of deaths by bronchitis, acute and chronic (42,567 in the first six months of 1898 and 37,741 in the first six months of 1897), and that of deaths from acute pneumonia (49,332 in the first-named period, as against 41,453 in the latter).—Rome correspondent Lancet

**QUEER MONEY IN ABYSSINIA.**

Travellers Tell Some Peculiar Stories on This Point.

The few travellers who have the time and trouble to look into Menelik's queer kingdom of Abyssinia, tell strange tales of it. Beside the Maria Theresa, 1870, dollars the people of Abyssinia, for small change use a bar of hard crystallized salt, about ten inches long, and two inches and a half thick, slightly tapering toward the end, five of which go to the dollar at the capital. People are very particular about the standard of fineness of the currency. If it does not ring like metal, or if it is chipped at all, nothing will induce them to take it. The nit is a token of affection among the natives, when friends meet, to give each other a lick of their respective amolls, and in this way, the material value of the bar is also increased. For still smaller changed cartridges are used, or which three go to one salt. It does not matter what sort they are—some sharpeners use their cartridges in the ordinary way, and then put some dust and a dummy bullet to make up the difference, or else they take out the powder and put the bullet in again, so that possibly in the next action the unhappy seller will find that he has only miss fire in his belt; but this is such a common fraud that no one takes any notice of it and a bad cartridge seems to serve as readily as a good one.
