September Proving Good Tourist Month Though normally not regarded as a tourist month in this Province, September bids fair to rival the more favored months in the number of visitors to the Island. The Confederation Chamber remains a Mecca for tourists with an estimated 2,000 visitors already this month. Nearly 500 of them signed the guest book. The visitors came from eight of the Canadian Provinces, nineteen of the United States as well as the District of Columbia, and even from Paris, France. The Provinces represented in the book are Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Newfoundland, Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Prince Edward Island.

From the United States the visitors came from New York, New Hampshire, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Washington, New Jersey, Illinois, Virginia, Tennessee, Maryland, Michigan, Pennsylvania, Indiana, Utah, Maine, Wisconsin, Delaware and Vermont. They represented almost all types of trades and professions as they registered their occupations as doctors, lawyers, students, teachers, farmers, housewives, chiropractors, chauffeurs, insurance men, savings bank employees, welfare workers, editors, Boy Scouts and Girl Guides, dentists, railwaymen, missionaries, electricians, grocers and physiotherapists. All were keen to see the room where Canada was born and all listened raptly to the description of the room given by Mr. Robert Craig, Corps of Commissioners, who is the official guide in the Chamber.

Former Reds Jenner gave no indication whether the alleged Red plot, which dated back a dozen years or so ago, was successful. The figures on the number of clergymen allegedly active in the Communist movement were given by Joseph Jack Kornfeder, 56-year-old native of Slovakia. Kornfeder said he joined the Communist party in 1919, was active in its councils in New York, New Jersey and Ohio, and quit the party in 1934. The plan to inject communism slyly into religion, Kornfeder told the committee, was conceived by high Communists when they discovered that they couldn't beat religion from the outside. "They created a thing that became known as the Living Church Movement," he said, and it was based "on the idea of interpreting the teachings of Christ and the apostles in a way that would serve to a large extent Communist purposes."

"The general idea is to move from the spiritual concept to the materialistic one and to make the church an instrument of social strife," he explained. "That is the psychological approach in this kind of an operation of working from inside of the church, and I may say that it was rather effective."

Speaks Of Medical Mission In Mexico Miss Jessie Laws, medical missionary from the United Christian Society of the Church of Christ, who is on furlough from Mexico spoke last night at Central Christian Church.

Miss Laws, who was born in British Columbia, has been doing medical missionary work in Mexico for 5-12 years and this fall will go to Boston, where she will take her degree in nursing from Simmons College. The work being undertaken in Mexico by the various Protestant denominations, co-operating with the National Evangelical Council of Churches has been carried on for the past 100 years. The place where Miss Laws, with the help of another medical missionary, conducts her pre-natal clinic is called Los Haro, in the State of Zacatecas.

They not only wait on confinement cases, but conduct a school in mid-wifery. They have had several native graduates from their school and these women in turn go back to their villages to give instruction to others. As a result of this work being carried on, the death rate from child birth in this area has markedly decreased. They serve about 20 villages and are on call at any hour that they may be needed. Since doctors are not plentiful in this isolated area, quite often, or most always, they work without the services of a physician.

British Protest Red Attack LONDON, (AP)—Britain filed a protest Friday to Red China against a Communist gunboat's attack that killed seven Britons and wounded five aboard a naval launch on patrol out of Hong Kong.

Orders went to the British envoy in Peking, charge d'affaires Humphrey Trevelyan, to tell Mao Tse-tun's government just what Britain thinks about the attack which occurred Wednesday in international waters at the mouth of the Pearl river southwest of the colony.

The foreign office did not disclose the contents of the note at once. But the government probably told the Chinese it considered the attack murder. Officials said Britain "certainly does not intend to stand idly by and watch that sort of thing happen again."

Informants said warships of the Royal Navy released from duty in Korean waters may be moved into the region in the coming weeks—just in case.

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Agreement Re Marketing Of Potatoes Now Signed

The agreement empowering the P. E. I. Potato Marketing Board through an authorized agency to market all or part of this year's island potato production on a co-operative basis, as previously announced in the press, has been signed between the Board and the Government of Canada under the provisions of the Agricultural Products Co-operative Marketing Act, 1939.

The agreement, which has been signed on behalf of the Federal Government by Rt. Hon. J. G. Gardiner, Minister of Agriculture, provides that the Government will guarantee an initial payment of 45 cents a bushel to all potato growers until December 31 of this year when the initial price will be increased by five cents per bushel. A further increase of five cents per bushel will go into effect on April 1, 1954.

In addition to the initial guarantee, the Federal Government guarantees the Potato Marketing Board a maximum payment of 25 cents per bushel for handling and administrative charges. Five separate pools are being instituted covering table stock, Colabier seed of foundation and certified grades and other varieties of Foundation and certified seed. The initial payment will be made when potatoes are delivered by producers to the selling agency, the personnel of which will be announced shortly.

Names New U.N. Commander In The Far East DENVER, (AP)—President Eisenhower Friday chose Gen. John E. Hull to be supreme commander of United States and United Nations forces in the Far East, succeeding Gen. Mark Clark.

Hull 58, will take over his new assignment officially on Oct. 30, when Clark will retire. Hull has been vice-chief of staff of the army for the last two years. Clark succeeded Gen. Matthew Ridgway, now army chief of staff, in the Far East commands.

Hull's formal titles will be commander in chief of the UN command and commander in chief of the Far Eastern command.
