Too Little Imagination In Most Brunch Menus

"Brunch is an American custom I greatly enjoy," observed the Chef. "It reminds me of the 'dejeuner' or second breakfast of France. But I find the brunch menu is usually stereotyped and lacking in imagination."
"For instance, hostesses could make more use of cheese dishes, such as our new Swiss panakes, to live interest and variety to the meal."
All measurements are level; recipes for 4 to 6.
Swiss panakes: To 1 1/4 c. fine-grated Swiss cheese, add 1 1/2 tsp. flour, 1/2 c. yogurt or butter-milk, 2 egg yolks, 1/2 tsp. salt and 1/2 tsp. curry powder. Mix thoroughly.
In a frypan, melt 2 tsp. butter. Drop in the mixture by heaping teaspoonfuls, 2 in. apart. Fry golden brown on both sides.
Sunday brunch: Pineapple-citrus cup, Swiss panakes, crisp bacon, green beans with peas, baked stuffed apples, coffee, tea, milk.
The new mozzarella muffins are especially good for brunch with pan-fish or fillets saute.
Mozzarella Muffins: Split three English muffins. Brush with butter.
On each half, place a large slice of tohato. Dust with salt and pepper. Top with 8 strips mozzarella cheese. Dust with minced chives.
Broil until cheese bubbles and slightly brown.
